

# THE FUSION WHICH PARTRIDGE ELDGES HIMSELF TO UPHOLD

## MINISTERS DENOUNCE SCHMITZ AS CHIEF EXECUTIVE

### BRAND HIM "GRAFTER"

Rev. Ernest Bradley  
Makes Strong  
Plea

Says Schmitz Sat  
Corruption on  
Throne.

The Rev. Ernest Bradley announced his resignation of the rectory of St. Stephen's Church, Fulton street, near Fillmore, yesterday morning, in a letter to the pastor of the parish with whom he has worked in the greatest harmony since he took the place of the late reverend pastor, the Rev. Edgar J. Lion.

In succeeding Mr. Lion, Mr. Bradley undertook a difficult position. The late pastor was identified with St. Stephen's parish for twenty-eight years. But the young clergyman went to work tired over the difficult period and as his regarders became to know him, their regard grew into a warm affection.

Mr. Bradley announced that he had accepted a call to St. Paul's Church, San Rafael, which is one of the most important suburban parishes of the diocese and numbers a very influential congregation.

The Rev. Mr. Bradley leaves a host of friends in San Francisco and it is for the sake of his family alone that he has decided to sever the strong tie which exists between himself and his flock.

During his sermon yesterday morning, Rev. Mr. Bradley alluded to the civic conditions of San Francisco and among other things said:

A new note has been struck in the political life of America, and none too soon.

The President of the United States is one of the noblest men of his age, and he is being elected by such men as Governor Folk of Missouri and Mayor Schmitz of San Francisco.

The thought brings us nearer home. We are reaching a crisis in San Francisco, it is the most remarkable municipal contest in America in being waged in such a manner.

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He said in part:

The man who has a vote and does not cast it is in the position of the servant in the parable, who, being entrusted by his lord with a talent and directed to put it out at interest, went instead and buried it.

His doom was severe. When his lord returned he was not merely excluded from the kingdom, but cast into that place of outer darkness where there is weeping and gnashing of teeth.

Just such a divinely given talent is the ballot placed in every man's hand. The citizen who fails to cast his ballot fairly and squarely for the candidate who in his honest and earnest conviction will give the best service to the community at large is guilty of a monstrous crime in the sight of God and man.

Half the great reforms have been won by independent men who have had the courage to forego all other personal considerations, their own interests and those of their friends, and to stand in the splendid limelight of their own patriotic convictions.

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## TO JUDGES OF THE LAW "GRAFTERS"

Campaign Committee Instructs Election Officers on Handling Voting Machines

HOLD CHALLENGE LISTS

Fusion Representatives Will Have Every Doubtful Vote Sworn in on Election Day

Not the least factor that will contribute to the defeat of Ruef and Schmitz tomorrow at the hands of the voters of San Francisco will be the thorough work done in the districts by Republican and Democratic workers under the direction of Jerry H. Newberry.

From the beginning the fusionists have realized that every effort would be made by Ruef to retain domination of local politics and that one of his strongest weapons would be colonization and illegal registration, and that the names of dead men and absentees would be voted in dozens if careful supervision was not instituted.

As a result of the labors of the workers in the districts every house has been visited and the fact that its registered occupants are still living there has been verified.

Yesterday, all day long, the men who are to constitute the fusion "watchers" in the polling booths tomorrow were instructed in the technicalities of the voting machines, at the fusion headquarters.

Each voter is to be sworn in at the time he enters the booth, and if a certain number is taken for a starting point, that number shall be recorded for reference when the polls close and subtracted from the total vote.

Watchers were told to stay in the booths as much as possible, but if compelled to leave to do so when things are going quietly and call for a volunteer watcher. If things are not going well fusion headquarters will know about it and send a replacement.

The officers were instructed to go over the rolls at nighttime and see if there were any of their personal friends that had not voted and to see that these stay-at-homes did so.

The men were ordered to report tonight to their district headquarters and secure badges, tickets and ballot cards and to be instructed as to verifying the reading of the tallies by the inspector when the machines are opened after the voting has ceased.

The men were instructed to see that the curtain lever is padlocked and the party ticket knobs locked before the back of the machine is opened.

As a last resort the boss turned to the Election Commissioners and ordered Schmitz's name to be placed on the ballot as a nominee of Independent Republicans and as the nominee of Independent Democrats.

Defeat is in store for Ruef at the polls tomorrow. Stuffed processions, false betting, forced assessments on city employees and the other devices of misrepresentation in support of the grafting administration cannot save the boss from crushing defeat.

Daniel A. Ryan, chairman of the Republican-Democratic campaign committee, has tonight ordered Partridge's election by a majority ranging from 800 to 12,000.

Thomas J. Walsh, formerly Registrar of Voters, and one of the campaign leaders, predicted that Partridge's majority will exceed 7,000.

Thomas W. Hickey, a gallant fighter in the cause of honest municipal government, is confident that Partridge's majority will exceed 8,000.

Hilley, chief of the fusion campaign committee is convinced that Partridge will win by 8,000 majority.

That the protected poolrooms of the city have combined to keep the betting odds on the election at 10 to 7, with Schmitz the favorite, and that small bettors who wager their money on the head of the graft ticket are, in sporting parlance, being used as "suckers," has been made apparent in the last few days.

The manager of the Union Labor party are planning the parade, which P. H. McCarthy is to head. The line of march will begin from Market and Second streets at 8 o'clock. Word has been sent to the fusion headquarters from many union workers that while they do not intend to vote for Schmitz they will march in the parade or suffer fines.

## REASONS FOR FUSION ARE SET FORTH IN BRIEF STATEMENT BY FRIENDS OF PURITY

LEADER TO BE TRUSTED

When the People Select Chief to Rout Corruption It Is a Sign of Good Qualities

The following address has been issued to voters by the friends of pure government and the enemies of graft:

To the Voters of San Francisco: Upon the eve of the election we wish to say a final word on behalf of the candidates nominated by the Republican and Democratic parties.

When the two great political parties espousing principles so divergent join hands in a municipal campaign, involving mutual sacrifice of identity, and of the ambitions of their members, some great emergency must actuate them.

When the people resolve themselves into a great committee of safety, the danger to our city must be as great from within as it would be from without if a hostile force were be-

When not only the two great political parties, but every person actively connected with those parties, acclaim a certain person to be their representative before the people, that person must have ability in a degree seldom met by the ordinary citizen.

The character of the entire ticket, composed as it is of trusted servants of the people, is an additional guarantee to the people. The head of our ticket, John S. Partridge, may not be a question to those who are in doubt. Most of his co-nominees are tried men.

The only issue, then, being the present administration, what does it offer to recommend it to the honest citizen, be he teller or capitalist, laborer or employer?

The Health Board has given us diseased meat and poisoned milk. The Board of Public Works has given us dirty streets and no improvements. The Civil Service Commission has given us politics in office and has proved the greatest enemy to civil service.

The Election Commission has been but an adjunct to the Mayor's office and has allowed the greatest enemy to civil service, the election commission, to be established.

All this and much more you have suffered because the government has been turned over to the control of the grafting administration.

The franchises have been sold, the saloons have been stocked, every legal interest has been bought and sold, the city's day laborers have been assessed, the building laws have been relaxed, the streets have been paved with money.
