VALLEJO PAINTER, WHO USED A KNIFE, MAY BE INSANE

Bound Over to Superior Court for Examination Into His Mental Condition.

VALLEJO, Dec. 1.—W. E. Lytle, a contracting painter of this city, who slashed Charles Love, a well-known member of the Vallejo Fire Department, across the face with a knife Thanksgiving day, was committed to the Superior Court by Judge Browne to-day for examination into his mental condition.

During an argument Lytle drew a knife and slashed at Love's throat. The blade entered the flesh near Love's left ear and cut downward toward his mouth.

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
