

ROANOKE'S STERN FRAME IS BAILY REPAIRS

It will take at least a month to repair the damage sustained on the Humboldt bar by the steamship Roanoke. Diver John Roach made a submarine investigation yesterday and discovered that the injury was more extensive than had been supposed.

The missing part of the stern frame broke off at the stern post, about two feet below the arch, about eighteen inches above the keel and about two feet forward of the stern. The rudder post snapped about four feet above the break in the stern post.

The underwriters decided yesterday to discharge the Roanoke's cargo, and on Wednesday the vessel will be placed on the Pacific Coast.

The Pacific Mail liner City of Peking, Captain Robinson, sailed yesterday for Panama and way ports. She carried a large cargo, which included a big shipment of California wine.

Lightship No. 83, from Blunt Reef, will leave today for her station on the Mendocino coast. She was at the Howard-street bulkhead yesterday filling her bunkers with coal.

The French bark Jacques was to have been towed yesterday to Mare Island, there to discharge her cargo of coal. The tug Reliance was alongside bright and early.

Five members of the crew of the Norwegian steamer Reldar, victims of trachoma, have escaped from the collar, and the local police are trying to find them.

Shipments of the overdue list are quoted for reimbursement as follows: Sausana, 65 per cent; River Indus, 30 per cent; Almora, 25 per cent; Giuseppe d'Aburo, 20 per cent; and MacMahon, 20 per cent.

JETTY SYSTEM IS A SUCCESS

New Method Used to Deepen Mare Island Channel Is Accomplishing Good Work

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The members of the First Finnish Evangelical Lutheran Church gathered at the corner of Harrison and Essex streets yesterday afternoon to attend the services connected with the laying of the cornerstone of what will soon be their magnificent new church.

The ceremonies were impressive and were performed in three different languages—Finnish, Swedish and English. On the highest point of the uncompleted structure floated the American flag, under which was the blue and white flag of Finland.

Rev. A. Renvall, pastor of the church, took an active part in the services throughout the afternoon and carried the programme to a successful end. He addressed the congregation in the Finnish language, and introduced those present with the need of the church for which they have been working ever since they were first organized in 1880 under the Rev. Mr. Tarikkanen, who was sent out from Finland to conduct the work.

Rev. Philip Andreen, Ph. D., pastor of the Swedish Ebenezer Church, Fifteenth and Dolores streets, gave a short history, in English, of the Finnish people since Christianity was first established in their land. Many great changes, he asserts, took place immediately after the establishment of the Protestant Lutheran Church in their country.

Literature was first spread throughout the country in the form of prayer books and Bibles. This was really the first step in learning. Several other addresses were given in different languages by prominent ministers of the different Lutheran churches about the city, after which the cornerstone was laid in the presence of a large crowd.

In the box were placed several pieces of Finnish money coined in 1880, several American coins, together with a history of the church from the time it was first organized in this city to the present day, and the latest American and Finnish papers that could be secured.

In 1880 the Rev. Mr. Tarikkanen, who was sent out by the Finnish Seamen's Society of Finland, established the first and only Finnish Lutheran church on the Pacific Coast. The church had a rapid growth from the start, and in 1899 the present pastor had it incorporated with a view to building their place of worship.

They succeeded in raising enough money to purchase the lot, with a considerable time there are about 3000 Finns in this city, most of whom are members of this church.
