Officers and Managers of Children's Hospital Say Additions Are Necessary

Reports Show a Big Growth in Institution's Work and Interest of Kindly Folk

The annual meeting of the Hospital for Children and Training School for Nurses was held yesterday. Mrs. W. B. Harrington, the president, was in the chair, and in her report said:

The demands have materially increased, which has necessitated that our main building should be replaced by an edifice more in keeping with the times. It does seem that a long established institution like ours, which has been able to secure funds to make improvements which are becoming more necessary. We should be glad to learn of some philanthropist who would assist us in securing this result.

Mrs. M. F. McGurn moved and it was resolved that the energies of the board during the present year be devoted to the raising of a building fund. Mrs. L. L. Kane, the treasurer, reported that there was on hand January 1, 1905, \$10,348 93. The receipts for the year from the hospital and dispensary were \$26,511 87. The sum of \$12,500 had been placed in the endowment fund and \$19,000 were in an emergency fund. A total of \$1090 was taken up. With unpaid bills of November and December, amounting to about \$450, the balance on hand in the current expense fund was \$3102 33. This all shows that with bills paid the hospital would have between \$4000 and \$5000 in its current expense fund.
