OAKLAND, Feb. 6.—While his fond mother is in agony lest he has gone to death by his own hand and the young woman who was to have been his bride is weeping over his abandonment of her, Charles S. Thompson, late vice principal of the Livermore High School, is probably in safe seclusion with the mysterious woman who threatened to kill him if he wedded another.

The true story of how Miss Monahan stepped between Thompson and Miss Alma Hand, whom he was to have married, is a dramatic one. The young bride had no intimation that another woman laid claim to the man whose wife she intended to become until Saturday night a week ago, when a party was being given her and her bridesmaids at the home of her sister, Mrs. H. R. Taylor, 1375 Regent street, Alameda, where Miss Hand has made her home for seven years.

MINUTE SAYS HE "FLIRTED" WITH DOROTHY OLSEN

Admits That He Was With Dorothy Olsen, but Denies the Charge of Assault

PLACES BLAME ON HER

Asserts She Encouraged Him to Follow Her and Make Love After They Left Car

OAKLAND, Feb. 6.—Lester C. McNulty surprised Judge, jurors and a crowded lobby to-day by taking the witness stand and admitting that he was with Miss Dorothy Olsen at the time of alleged assault on the evening of November 5.

Not only did McNulty admit that he was the man who was with her, but he admitted everything the girl has said, except that he had any criminal intent. He positively declared that it was a flirtation and that he was encouraged by the woman.

And Dorothy Olsen, who, with a sister and two women friends, was present, laughed heartily out in court when the aged father of the defendant accused her of having encouraged McNulty's extreme amusement at the turn affairs had taken bordered closely on hysterics in the courtroom.

McNulty yesterday said he would admit nothing, but to contrary expectations, but as predicted in The Call, he said that the girl was right in everything she had said except the charge that he had attacked her.

McNULTY'S VERSION

This is the story that McNulty told on the stand of his experiences with Dorothy Olsen: On Monday evening, November 5, 1905, I boarded a car of the Telegraph avenue line about 9 o'clock.

EXPLAINS WHY HE RAN

McNulty testified he ran to prevent a fight from breaking out, and that he went back for the overcoat which he had forgotten, and which was the means of his identification.

POSITION DECLARED VACANT

The position of vice principal of the Livermore High School, held by the missing man, was to-day declared vacant by the School Trustees, and this action believed to have been taken on information furnished to the members of the board by Roy Hand, a brother of the deserted girl, who visited Livermore shortly after Thompson's disappearance.
