REVENUE AGENTS STOP A FRAUD

Big Distillery at Antioch Seized by Bert Thomas for Using "Black Strap"

MAY BE CONFISCATED Federal Officials Now in Charge of Plant Which Has Scored Second Offense

Once again has the big brandy distillery at Antioch been detected in the act of illicit distilling and the confiscation of the entire plant, value at more than \$20,000, is threatened. The distillery was seized last Friday night by Special Revenue Agent Bert Thomas and Deputy Internal Revenue Collector F. E. Ellis of Stockton. The property belongs to the California Distilling Company and is now in possession of internal revenue officers. The distillery is bonded for the manufacture of "grape brandy" from grapes and other fresh fruits and for that reason has been permitted to do business without the presence of a United States storekeeper and a United States gauger, who are required to have charge of all grain distilleries. The Federal officials learned that some months past the distillery has been manufacturing spirits out of "black strap molasses" in violation of the law. The internal revenue law regulating distilleries, etc., is very stringent and violations are punishable with confiscation of the entire plant, including the land upon which the buildings, warehouses, etc., are situated. In the case of grain distilleries, which alone may be molasses as well as grain for the raw material, a storekeeper and a gauger are placed in charge to see that the books correctly show the total number of gallons manufactured and the amount of internal revenue tax due at \$1.19 per gallon. In grape brandy distilleries, however, no revenue officers are stationed and in addition to the prospective penalty of confiscation the owners of such establishments are required to file a heavy bond to comply with the law. Special Agent Thomas and Deputy Collector Ellis will visit the distillery on Monday to take an inventory of the seized property. This establishment was seized by the Federal authorities several years ago for a violation of law and the owners were obliged to pay the Government several thousand dollars to compromise the matter.
