

**VON BULOW
FANTS IN
REICHSTAG**

**Chancellor Collapses After
Making a Speech on the
Moroccan Conference and
the Policy of Germany**

**BREAKDOWN CAUSED
BY RECENT OVERWORK**

**Prince Informs the Chamber
That Kaiser Would Not
Have Gone to War and Is
Satisfied With Outcome**

BERLIN, April 5.—Chancellor von Bulow, while attending the debate in the Reichstag today, fainted and was carried to a committee room by some of the members of the House. The Chancellor made a speech on the subject of Morocco and was listening to the answer of Herr Bebel, the Socialist leader, when he was taken ill. The vice president then adjourned the sitting for a quarter of an hour, during which deep silence prevailed throughout the House. Drs. Mugdan and Brecker, members of the Reichstag, had in the meantime gone to the assistance of the Chancellor. Professor Rudolph Renvers, head of the German Hospital, reached the room some time later, and after examining the Chancellor said that he was only suffering from a severe fainting spell, the result of influenza, and that there were no indications of paralysis, which was at first feared.

The physicians cleared the sitting-room and transferred the Chancellor to a lounge, only Princess von Bulow, who had joined her husband, remaining with him. Simple stimulants were used, and the Chancellor soon was able to speak and move his limbs.

CAUSED BY OVERWORK.

A few minutes after Von Bulow fainted telephone messages were sent to the Princess von Bulow and to the Emperor. The Princess reached her husband as soon as Professor Renvers. The Emperor was at luncheon when the news was conveyed to him, and he immediately arose, canceled all his engagements for the afternoon and ordered a carriage to go to the Reichstag. Emperor William came to the door later, but was not permitted to enter, as the Chancellor was sleeping. The Empress later also called at the Reichstag to inquire about the Chancellor's health.

Prince von Bulow spoke for about half an hour on the Moroccan question at the opening of the day's session in his usual animated style. It was observed that his face was very red and that he seemed to have difficulty in drawing his breath. It appears that during a dinner which he gave to a small party of friends at his residence on April 3 the Chancellor took medicine twice, suffering from a severe cold. He also took a wineglass of medicine while in the smoking-room instead of any liquors. The Chancellor was in his usual spirits yesterday morning, but went word to Ambassador Tower that he regretted being unable to dine at the American embassy that evening, as he was ill.

Von Bulow's breakdown is undoubtedly due to overwork during the Moroccan conference. Owing to the difference in time, the dispatches covering each day's proceedings arrived late and the Chancellor often had to go to the palace at a late hour. He has been working from eight in the morning to midnight for three months past.

TAKEN TO HIS HOME.

When the session of the Reichstag was resumed Herr Bebel, instead of continuing his speech, ended his remarks abruptly. Various members then expressed their regret at the Chancellor's illness.

Business was continued because it was thought that an adjournment of the house would alarm the public. But the voices of the speakers who followed Herr Bebel were pitched in a low tone, though they thought they might disturb the sleeping Chancellor in the adjoining room, as word was passed around from time to time that he still slept. Toward 4 o'clock Von Bulow awoke, was supported to his carriage and was driven home.

Professor Renvers, at 5 o'clock p. m., issued the following bulletin:

"His Highness Prince von Bulow suffered from a fainting fit, from which he has now recovered."
In the Reichstag today, previous to his collapse, Von Bulow said that he wished to make a limited expression of the Government's Moroccan interests that have not formally completed its work, and because the question had not been discussed by other Parliaments. Besides, he did not wish to risk disturbing the agreement arrived at after so long a struggle.

NO THOUGHT OF WAR.

Continuing the Chancellor said: "There have been weeks when the minds of the people were disturbed by thoughts of war. Why was this the case? Are our interests in Morocco vital enough for us to believe that German interests were so menaced as to oblige us to consider the possibility of war? No. The Government did not consider the possibility of war. We have no direct political interests in Morocco, no political aspirations, no historical rights like France and Spain. But we have commercial interests that have a future. We were a partner in the international convention which held that all the powers were entitled to the most-favored nation rights. It was a question of the dignity and prestige of the German empire, and we could not give way."

"It was not our intention to gain a footing in Morocco. This would have weakened instead of strengthened our position. We did not want to oppose the old historical and political rights of France and Spain so long as the interests of German trade were respected. We did not want to irritate England because she had drawn closer to France. We wanted to give significance to the fact that Germany was not a negligible quantity, and that the text and basis of an international treaty could not be changed without the consent of the signatory powers, and that the door for free foreign competition must be kept open in important territory near two of the world's trade routes. An international conference was, we thought, the best means to attain peacefully these aims."

Professor Renvers has advised Chancellor von Bulow to take a month's rest. Parliament adjourned today until April 22.
