DYNAMITE IS HURLED INTO CANC

Railroad Men Fight With High Explosives. Graders for a Big Road Use Deadly Sticks as Weapons.

One Man Is Injured by Flying Rock in Battle Between Graders of Rival Lines.

WOULD BARTER WIFE'S HONOR

Millionaire Hartje Charged With Having Attempted to Bribe White Coachman

PITTSBURG, April 12.—What is considered the real sensation of the Hartje divorce case was sprung here this afternoon when Thomas Madine came out in a public statement through the newspapers accusing Hartje and three others of having tried to bribe him with \$50,000 to swear falsely against Mrs. Hartje in a divorce suit then to be entered, and when Madine refused he alleges he was then named as one of the correspondents in the now famous case along with her negro coachman, who is in jail for perjury.
