

Wholesalers Are to Remain

Will Reopen in a Few Days With \$8,000,000 Stock.

HOLD MEETING IN OAKLAND

8000 Cars of Freight Are on the Way to City.

"Back to San Francisco" was the slogan adopted by the wholesale merchants of the city, at their meeting yesterday morning in Masonic Temple, Oakland. The merchants decided that the first and most important move for them to make is the selection of a site for a new wholesale district in San Francisco and the immediate resumption of business on that site. The idea of getting a dozen blocks of land in the vicinity of Third and Townsend streets, near the Southern Pacific Company's depot and yards, in which temporary buildings for the wholesale men may be erected, appealed to the merchants as a most feasible suggestion.

August Breuner was made chairman of the meeting and Adolph Uhl secretary. A dozen speeches by prominent wholesalers voiced the sentiment of the meeting, which apparently was unanimous in favor of the speedy return of all the wholesale men to San Francisco, unity of action and the prevention of a scattering of the firms being regarded as most essential.

Generous offers from Oakland real estate owners of sites and accommodations for business were reported, but the acceptance of these for any but temporary use was not encouraged. The merchants adjourned to meet in conference with the Board of Trade of San Francisco during the afternoon at Franklin Hall. Another meeting will be held at 2 p. m. to-day at Masonic Temple.

At the afternoon meeting the wholesalers considered offers made by real estate men of blocks of land in the vicinity of Third and Townsend streets. The real estate men guaranteed that temporary buildings would be erected within fifteen days.

There are now 2500 cars of freight here ready for delivery and 8000 cars are on the way. This means that within a few days the city's wholesale trade will be resumed with a stock worth \$8,000,000.

REAL ESTATE MEN SELECT TEMPORARY HEADQUARTERS

Directors Decide to Prevent Shifting of Business Center for the Present.

The real estate men of San Francisco have selected temporary headquarters at Van Ness avenue and Fulton street. The board of directors of the San Francisco Real Estate Board met yesterday at 2126 Fillmore street. The directors present were: Messrs. J. R. Howell, John T. Harnes, S. G. Buckbee, E. L. Hoag, T. E. Magee, John H. Speck, George D. Toy, B. L. Cadwallader, D. Rich and Samuel Center.

It was the unanimous opinion that every effort should be made at the present time to prevent the shifting of the business and financial center. R. G. Hooker offered the block bounded by Van Ness avenue, Grove, Fulton and Polk streets at a nominal rental for temporary quarters for dealers, and it was accepted. The space available will be apportioned among the members of the board, outside real estate men, and also among persons in trade allied with the real estate business, such as contractors, builders, plumbers, carpenters, etc.

All persons desiring space at this location will apply to the secretary of the board, E. L. Cadwallader, at 2126 Fillmore street, before 12 o'clock noon on Saturday next.

Real estate men realize that six months at least must elapse before the downtown districts will be open for general business.

No sales are being allowed for the present, as values are being jealously guarded. All property owners are advised that no depreciation will prevail, and that within a few months their holdings will be more valuable than ever.

From this time forward the United States quartermaster's department, under the orders of Major General Greely will have absolute control of the distribution of rations to the hungry and clothing to the needy. Payment for service in distributing relief will not cease. The idea is that the Government will lift a burden from the citizens who are struggling for renewal of business activity by taking care of the hungry and homeless.

MRS. OELRICHS NOT PERTURBED

Loss of Her Property Calmly Accepted.

SACRAMENTO, April 26.—Mrs. C. O. Alexander of San Francisco has arrived from New York and is at the residence of Dr. and Mrs. S. E. Simons, 2431 M street. Mrs. Alexander was in New York on Wednesday of last week, at the home of Mrs. Herman Oelrichs, when the news of the earthquake and the conflagration arrived. She emphatically denies the report published in the Eastern papers that Mrs. Oelrichs was completely prostrated at her loss.

"I was with Mrs. Oelrichs," said Mrs. Alexander, "when she received news of the great calamity. She acted admirably and did not mention financial matters at all.

"Her generous spirit was shown when Mr. Mackay placed a wire at her disposal for news from San Francisco. She immediately turned the wire over to me, so that I could ascertain the safety of my children.

"When the news arrived of the complete loss of the Hialto and Crossley buildings, which she lately came into possession of, she made little of it, but felt keenly for the destruction of the Fairmont Hotel, which she built but recently sold.

"Mrs. Oelrichs was the first person in New York to devise means to aid the sufferers in San Francisco, and through the kindness of Mr. Black, owner of the Hippodrome, the immense amphitheater gave two benefit performances on Saturday afternoon and evening, which netted a handsome sum.

"The Californians in New York all acted philosophically. They took their losses with the best of good will and were more anxious over the safety of relatives and friends than on account of any pecuniary loss.

"In New York when I left were several prominent residents of California, among them being: Mrs. Charles Alexander, Mrs. Charles Childs, Mr. and Mrs. Raoul Duval, Mr. and Mrs. Francis Carolan, Mr. and Mrs. George Lent, Walter E. Dean, Mrs. C. G. Hooker and Miss Hooker.

"The Joseph S. Tobins, Richard Hotelling, the Percy Morgans, Richard H. Pease and several others left New York immediately for San Francisco on receipt of the news.

"A benefit performance will be given by Henry Miller and company for the relief fund.

"Addison Mizner was seen in New York and was greatly worried about the safety of his mother. I learned to-day that she is safe and is stopping with the Bournes in Napa County.

"On the train on which I arrived were 2100 telegrams sent from New York on the 19th and 20th, but which could not be transmitted. These telegrams will be mailed from San Francisco and reach their proper destinations. I am glad to state that the genuine spirit of California prevailed among our people in the East. Everywhere you meet a native of the State he tells you he will not go back on his old home, but intends to rebuild. Mrs. Oelrichs intends rebuilding her destroyed properties as soon as affairs shape themselves properly."

J., enclosing a check for \$250 for the relief of afflicted families of police officers. He also received a check for \$100 from Chief of Police Delaney of Seattle for the same purpose. The money will be placed to the credit of the Widows and Orphans Aid Association of the department.

TRANSPORT SHERMAN LANDS PASSENGERS AT FOLSOM STREET

Troopship Arrives From the Philippines.

Departs for Puget Sound This Morning.

The transport Sherman, Captain Bruguiere, arrived yesterday from Manila by way of Nagasaki and Honolulu. She brought 75 first-class passengers, 34 second cabin and 142 in the steerage. She at once anchored off Folsom street wharf, where her passengers were landed. She will sail this morning at 10 o'clock for Seattle, where she will take supplies and troops for the Philippines.

The Oceanic Steamship Company's office is now in working order at Pier 7.

The steamship Alameda will sail on Sunday, at 3 p. m., for Honolulu, and will carry many passengers and such cargo as can conveniently be brought to the ship.

The bark Coronado will sail in a day or so for Honolulu to bring back a cargo of sugar.

The liner Ventura, from Sydney, via Honolulu, is due Monday. Her passengers will be landed at Pier 7, as usual.

JORDAN THINKS EARTH IS QUIET

He Says Temblors Are Now at Rest.

President David Starr Jordan of Stanford University is confident that San Francisco and vicinity will be immune from severe seismic disturbances for many years to come.

Speaking to a Call man at Stanford University yesterday, the president said: "The recent earthquake shock that tumbled down buildings in San Francisco is not likely to be repeated for many years. The recent disturbance is a fault or break of the inner hard crust of the earth.

"As far as we can trace, the temblor began near Glen Ellen, in Sonoma County, extended past Valencia street, San Francisco, through San Bruno, Baden, between San Mateo and Burlingame across to Mile Page road south of the Stanford University. The temblor then crossed near to Pajaro and Salinas. Practically it is one of the earth's throes by which this peninsula has been formed or molded. It has nothing to do with Vesuvius or any other volcano."

Dr. J. C. Branner, vice president of the university, head of the geology department and one of the greatest geology specialists in the country, has organized a party of the senior students of geology to make an extensive study of the results of the temblor on the district extending between Santa Cruz and San Francisco. They will gather data on their observations. Farmers bring in strange stories of queer geological formations in the mountains near the coast and the studies of Dr. Branner's party may reveal some very interesting facts to the scientific world.

Speaking of the effects of the earthquake on the financial status of the university aside from the damage to the buildings, President Jordan said: "The university securities are held in an undervault in San Francisco. The bonds are all registered. The university has lost nothing of its capital and practically none of its working buildings, but the ornamental structures are hopelessly destroyed. We have heard nothing from the board of trustees. Many of them have suffered severely from fire in San Francisco and are occupied with their own affairs."

The work of rebuilding the business district of Palo Alto has begun. A citizen guard is maintained at the approaches of the town to stop the entrance of undesirable characters from San Francisco. Curiously seekers are not yet allowed to travel toward San Francisco on the Southern Pacific.

BIG FUND TO BE RAISED TO AID RETAIL CLERKS

Call Designated as the Official Depository for Money for the Cause.

SALT LAKE, April 26.—A subscription list for the benefit of traveling men representing San Francisco houses was started at a local hotel tonight, and it is expected by the travelers who started it that the movement will spread all over the United States. Not only are the traveling salesmen to be cared for until they can secure other positions, but every retail clerk in San Francisco, both male and female, will be assisted in it in need of help.

The San Francisco Call has been designated as the official depository in that city, the Herald in Salt Lake, and every newspaper and hotel in the United States is requested to receive donations to the fund and forward them to The Call. One hundred and eighty-five dollars was raised here in a few minutes.

TEMPORARY OFFICES OPENED FOR BUSINESS

Offices of the San Francisco free public library have been opened by the secretary in the branch at 2435 Sacramento street, to which all employees are asked to send their addresses.

The main library contained 128,300 books. Six branches were burned. Four, containing 30,000 books, were saved. Those saved are the new one at Sixteenth street near Market, costing \$50,000, and those at 2435 Sacramento street, 2664 Mission street and 254 Fourth avenue.

The insurance was between \$50,000 and \$75,000.
