

## MISUNDERSTANDING CAUSES HUNDREDS TO GO HUNGRY

Food Distribution  
Fails at Relief  
Station.

Applicants Wait in  
Vain for Over  
Two Hours.

Several hundred men, women and children stood in line before the relief station at the corner of Haight and Cole streets yesterday morning awaiting the daily distribution of food supplies. Through some misunderstanding no provision had been made for this district, which has a population, according to the official census, of between 5000 and 6000 people. The applicants remained in line for upward of two hours, and were then dispersed by order of Colonel Ogden, who ascertained that it would not be possible to secure a fresh supply of provisions until nearly noon.

Colonel Ogden, who has been in charge of the supplies for the first military district, heretofore patrolled by the National Guard, made the following statement:

"I cannot account for the failure to deliver supplies. Yesterday afternoon I visited the military headquarters established by Lieutenant Pourrie of the regular army and made requisition for the usual number of rations. I was informed by the officer in charge that the requisition would be honored to-night or tomorrow morning. Before my departure there was approved a requisition for 12,000 full rations, to be delivered at substation 200, corner of Page and Stanyan streets. In the meanwhile our supply is exhausted, and the people we have fed daily since the fire are hungry. Chaplain Miel of the Second Infantry reports to me that he has been unable to secure even a supply of milk for babies, though the milk is absolutely necessary."

It was ascertained that many of the people who failed to get food at Haight and Cole streets later applied to stations in the neighborhood and secured food at about 11 o'clock.

Lieutenant Pourrie, who is in charge of the district just created by the order of General Greely, made the following statement:

"All relief stations were supposed to make requisition for supplies yesterday and were furnished with orders upon the various stations. This morning I found on my desk the requisition presented by Colonel Ogden and sent it to his headquarters with a note directing him how to proceed. I cannot say why this requisition was not honored yesterday."

"I cannot believe that any of these people went hungry, as there were two relief stations issuing supplies in the immediate neighborhood. Many of these people have ample supplies in their homes, and some of them have been repeating and securing food on the same day from different stations. The new order did not go into effect until noon yesterday, and this probably accounts for the confusion or misunderstanding. Under present conditions there is no necessity for so many relief stations and some of them will be abolished."

GENERAL WOODRUFF  
REPRESENTS GREELY

Working in Conjunction With the  
General Relief Committee  
in Alameda.

OAKLAND, May 2.—Brigadier General C. A. Woodruff, U. S. A., retired, has been appointed the local representative of General Greely and is working in conjunction with the General Relief Committee in distributing supplies for refugees in Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley. It is expected that within a few days, when additional troops arrive from the East, General Greely's department will assume entire control of the distribution of stores on this side of the bay.

Captain A. P. Smiley and E. K. Taylor, representing the Relief Committee of Alameda, were given an order this evening by General Woodruff for a carload of provisions, to be apportioned among 7200 refugees in Alameda.

At the meeting of the executive committee of the General Relief Committee this evening the Rev. P. C. Yorke was unanimously requested to resign from the executive committee, but refused to comply. The request was made by the executive committee after it had heard the report of a committee appointed Monday to investigate the charges made by Father Yorke that persons of his faith had been refused supplies by the Relief Committee. The investigating committee, consisting of Rabbi Friedlander, H. G. Morrow and Mr. Fogarty of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, reported that the charges made by Father Yorke were trivial.

Mayor Gets \$1,000 Check.  
Mayor Schmitt on Tuesday received from the Midwall Steel Company of Philadelphia, a check for \$1,000 as that corporation's contribution to the relief fund.

Attach bill to back of claim form. Make out a separate bill for each requisition or authority.

Attach authority to back of bill. Sign claim form and have signature acknowledged by a Notary Public.

All claims must be presented on regular forms provided for the purpose, otherwise they will not be considered.

In the absence of proper authority for supplies purchased or confiscated, get the certificate or sworn statements from reliable parties as to the value of stock taken, the time of taking, and the party or parties who took the supplies in question.

## Emergency Claims

All persons having claims for labor, claims for supplies purchased or confiscated on account of relief work prior to twelve o'clock noon, Saturday, April 28, 1906, must be presented to Claim Department of Finance Committee, attached to Special Emergency Claim form provided for the purpose.

Blanks may be had on application to Claim Department at the Office of the Finance Committee, Hamilton School, Geary Street, between Scott and Pierce Streets.

## CLAIMS NOTICE TO MERCHANTS

All goods purchased for relief work after 12 o'clock noon, Saturday, April 28, 1906, must be accompanied by printed Requisition Blank properly signed by Chairman and Receiving Clerk.
