

LAWYER JOHNSON SCORES WITNESSES IN STEINMAN CASE Denounces Them as Riffraff and Charges Them With Perjury. Says Counsel for the Prosecution Has Coached Them to Lie.

Hiram Johnson, counsel for Jacob H. Steinman, accused of the murder of Joseph Myers in Columbia square on the night of April 19, broke forth Saturday into denunciation of Henry Ach, special counsel for the prosecution; Assistant District Attorney O'Gara and the witnesses for the people.

"I don't propose to sit here and have these men (pointing to Ach and O'Gara) laughing in the face of this witness. They brought a lot of riffraff here as witnesses, outrageous witnesses, and notwithstanding the manner in which they testified I treated them courteously. There is no doubt that many of your witnesses have been coached and have perjured themselves here. I don't propose to let you sneer at this witness."

O'Gara suggested that Johnson at the proper time would have an opportunity of arguing the case. "You can have the court settle this matter, but we won't take it from you," he said.

"You will take it from me," hotly retorted Johnson. Judge Graham, who was in the line of possible flats and fire, interposed with a few soothing remarks and pacified the seemingly irate lawyers.

Bush's testimony differed very materially from that of the witnesses for the people. His story was that while he was assisting Corporal Steinman in picking out twelve able-bodied men to go after supplies Myers came up and said: "I'll see to this."

He was a stranger to Bush, and neither told him who he was nor what was his authority. "I asked Myers what his business was," resumed Bush, and he called me a vile name, grabbed me by the vest and said, 'I'll show you,' at the same time attempting to assault me."

FATHER OF A MAN TO BE REBUILT Handsome Edifice Will Be Erected at Dolores and Sixteenth. Traditions of the Historic Parish Are to Be Preserved.

His Grace Archbishop Riordan, the head of the Catholic church on this coast, is showing advanced ideas in the plan he is formulating for the rebuilding of the churches destroyed by the fire.

After a consultation with Father Cummings, pastor of the Mission Dolores Church, he has been practically decided to rebuild at Sixteenth and Dolores streets in keeping with the modern spirit which is actuating the property-owners at the present time.

While the original old adobe church, which has stood since the early days of the city, was practically uninjured, the recently built church was badly damaged. Instead of rebuilding this new church on its former lines it will be torn down and a splendid edifice will take its place.

The members of the parish have not been badly scattered by the fire which burned along its edges. This insures representative congregations when services are resumed in the Old Mission Church, which will be within a brief period.

ALAMEDA NOW GETTING BETTER TRAIN SERVICE Southern Pacific Company Begins Operating Over the "Loop" System from Oakland Mole.

OAKLAND, May 13.—Local Southern Pacific trains began running on the "loop" system from the Oakland mole to the Alameda mole and vice versa, affording a twenty-minute service to either ferry depot and practically a ten-minute accommodation to stations on the "horse-shoe" route.

CHIEF DINAN SUSPENDS HIM FOR BECOMING DRUNK AND VIOLENT. Inebriated Patrolman Draws Pistol and Shoots at Citizen.

Pollerman W. E. Cooney is the first member of the force to bring disgrace upon himself and discredit to the department since the earthquake.

Cooney had been on duty all night and reported off at 7 o'clock yesterday morning. He got liquored somewhere and shortly after the noon hour, while the wife of Adolph G. Hieronimus, brewmaster for the Wunder Brewing Company, was standing at Scott and Lombard streets with her husband, Cooney, speaking to some one near the street, was using most offensive language and acting in a boisterous manner.

Cooney later was placed under arrest at the scene of the riot, but Hieronimus declined to prefer a charge against him. The Chief suspended Cooney from duty and relieved him of his uniform, and he was taken to the Stanyan-street station for drunkenness.
