LIFE IS SAVED BUT MIND GONE

TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE OF SPOKANE MINER IN DEATH VALLEY

SPOKANE, June 4.—Death Valley in its whole history of horrors, has nothing more dreadful than the fate of D. H. Boyer, a mining man formerly of Spokane, who, for three days and nights wandered over the California inferno to escape at last by a miracle, alive, yet demented and so emaciated in body that he will never be himself again.

The terrible tale of his hardship is brought by Fred Birney, one of the discoverers of the famous Furnace Creek copper mine. Boyer was sent into Death Valley by a San Francisco outfit to examine the California mine near the Furnace Creek property.

At 8 o'clock that night the foreman of Borax Smith's Death Valley ranch saw Boyer wandering aimless and purposeless. It would have been fatal to give him more than a few drops of water, and it was hours before the ranchers would leave him alone, even for a moment.
