TREASURY WILL DEPOSIT \$12,000,000 WITH SAN FRANCISCO BANKS

FIFTY KILLED IN ANTI-JEWISH RIOT IN A RUSSIAN VILLAGE

AMERICAN OF BOSTON WILL PAY 40 CENTS ON DOLLAR AND GO TO ITS GRAVE

PRESIDENT APPROVES PLAN SUBMITTED BY RELIEF COMMITTEE

Bonds of the City Will Be Given as Security for Funds to Be Loaned for Rebuilding Purposes by the Government.

SECRETARY SHAW GIVES ASSURANCE MONEY WILL STAY HERE FOR YEARS

House Passes the Bill Granting to the State of California Five Per Cent of the Net Proceeds From the Sale of Public Lands.

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE CALL.

CALL BUREAU, POST BUILDING, WASHINGTON, June 19.—With the President's approval, the Secretary of the Treasury will accept the bonds of the city of San Francisco to the amount of \$12,000,000 as security for the deposit of Government funds in the national banks of that city.

It was definitely settled today, what has never been a matter of much doubt, that no Congressional aid can be obtained. Hon. Leslie M. Shaw, Secretary of the Treasury, today conferred with the finance committee of the Senate with reference to the proposed plan of relief.

SHAW HAS AUTHORITY TO ACT.

Under existing law, the Secretary of the Treasury will take such measures as he deems best, and he desired the finance committee to indorse in a formal way the action which he proposed to take.

Judge Morrow and his committee have conferred constantly with President Roosevelt and the leading members of the administration and have found them all desirous of giving every assistance possible.

OUTLINES RESULTS OF MISSION.

Judge Morrow tonight gave out the following statement: "Having accomplished the substantial purpose of our mission, we will return to San Francisco. Our Senators and Representatives in Congress have done the work, while the committee has provided the ammunition.

HOUSE PASSES CALIFORNIA CLAIM.

"The next proposition relates to the erection of houses for the shelter of the homeless, or such of them as can be provided for in that way. It involves the formation of a corporation in San Francisco with at least a million dollars paid-up capital for building purposes.

RACE WAR SPREADING IN EMPIRE

Hundred Victims of Mob Borne to Graves in Bialystok.

Christians Loot Hebrew Homes While Troops Look On.

Late Massacre Provoked by Emissaries of the Government.

LONDON, June 19.—The Jewish World has received the following dispatch from Dvinsk (also termed Duanaberg), province of Vitebsk, 110 miles southeast of Riga, dated June 18: "Fifty persons have been killed in the anti-Jewish rioting at Starosielce, not far from Bialystok. The state of mind of the populace is indescribable."

ST. PETERSBURG, June 19.—A circumstantial report is in circulation today of an attempt on the life of General Treppoff, commandant of the palace, by a well-dressed woman masquerading as Princess Narshkina.

The massacre of Jews at Bialystok has shocked the country and added to the general excitement, and the revelations which the committee of the lower house of Parliament, set to investigate the outbreak at Bialystok, is expected to make, will only add fuel to the flames.

IN SPITE OF THE GOVERNMENT'S left-handed denial that it intends to order a Parliamentary recess, the Beck today expressed the fear that a coup d'etat was imminent and appealed to the country to make its voice heard in favor of the dismissal of the Ministry and a prolongation of the existence of Parliament.

Private letters received here from Kharkoff predict that the entire south of Russia will be in a state of open revolution within a month.

MURDERS AND ROBBERIES. TIFLIS, Caucasasia, June 13.—The lawlessness in the Caucasus is increasing. In spite of the patrols of soldiers and police murder and robbery are unchecked in this city.

SUICIDE OF ACTOR DUE TO LOVE

Benjamin Howard Friend of Mrs. Yerkes-Mizner.

Disappointed When She "Makes Up" With Husband.

Reported That He Spent Much Time at Her Home.

NEW YORK, June 19.—The suicide of Benjamin Howard, formerly of the Alcazar stock company of San Francisco and lately of the "Rollicking Girl" company, who was found dead on a bench in Riverside drive, was due less to the unrequited love of a certain actress, according to Broadway wiseacres, than to disappointment over the reported reconciliation of Wilson Mizner and his bride, the former Mrs. Charles Yerkes.

GOVERNMENT AGENTS INVESTIGATE ALLEGED NEST OF ANARCHISTS

Secret Service Men on Trail of the Reds Located in Portland.

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AGENT IS SENT TO WIND UP AFFAIRS

R. W. Hosmer, Who Comes From Chicago for Broken Insurance Concern, Makes Statement.

Says, Pessimistically, That 20 Cents Will Be Paid by Some and Predicts Period of Chaos.

OAKLAND, June 19.—The American Insurance Company of Boston, with a loss of \$1,200,000 by the San Francisco fire, of which \$200,000 is in reinsurance companies said to be shaky, has decided to pay its policy-holders 40 cents on the dollar and go out of business.

GIVES OUT A PROPHECY OF CHAOS.

Hosmer adds a grain of real comfort to his pessimistic utterances by announcing, with an insurance adjuster's prophetic eye, that six months hence the insurance conditions in San Francisco will be much more chaotic than they are now.

Hosmer's definite stand on a basis of 40 cents gives the American of Boston the doubtful distinction of setting the lowest rate yet announced. The American of Boston sees the "six-bit" companies and goes them several better, or rather worse, from the policy-holders' standpoint.

IS CONVINCED DIRECTORS ARE HONEST.

"It was in 1818 that the American Insurance Company of Boston was established, and its career has been an honorable one. The present directors and stockholders of the company are all honest persons, and will do their best in an honest way to settle with the policy-holders of the company.

We have just begun to do this. Our losses in San Francisco are \$1,200,000. Of this amount \$200,000 is in reinsurance companies, and some of these are ready to quit.

SEES LITTLE HAPPINESS FOR VICTIMS.

"Many of the companies are in dire straits and need assistance, and that assistance should be given them. Suppose there was such an agitation against the banks as there is now against the insurance companies, imagine what fair-minded people would do."
