HONOLULU, June 25.—The yacht Anemone has been sighted from Diamond Head, La Paloma, the Hawaiian entry in the transoceanic race from San Pedro, Cal., has twenty-seven hours' allowance after the Anemone to entitle her to second place.

WATERS BREAK THROUGH LEVEE. Ten Thousand Acres of Growing Crops Are Inundated.

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE CALL. STOCKTON, June 25.—At 1 o'clock this morning one of the main levees of Old River broke, and some 10,000 acres of the choicest crops of Union Island are now under water.

Every day yesterday the water in Old Middle and San Joaquin rivers kept rising steadily. At Clifton Court, before the break occurred, the river reached a height of twelve feet three inches, or nearly a foot and a half higher than it has ever been known to attain at that point.

The break occurred near the Chinese camp at Kuckak landing, opposite Cony Island. About fifty feet of the levee went out and immediately there was a great inrush of water from the river, the bed of which is higher than the surrounding reclaimed lands.
