Mrs. Brown took the next hole and Mrs. Martin evened the score by taking the succeeding one. Mrs. Martin took the remaining two holes, completing the first round 2 up, a lead which would have assured her the match under ordinary conditions.

Both players improved in the second round. Mrs. Brown won the first. The next was tied. Mrs. Brown won the third and fourth, making her 1 up.

Mrs. Martin won the fifth, making the score even again. Mrs. Brown took the next three holes, which gave her the match.

Mrs. Brown's score for the last eight holes played was 35, while Mrs. Martin's was 39. This form is seldom beaten by the men in competition at Burlingame.
