

Facing Stewards Take

Shields Brothers Are Punished WELL-KNOWN MEN BARRED FROM THE TRACK.

NEW YORK, July 13.—The stewards of the Jockey Club, the controlling body of the Eastern turf, took drastic action yesterday in the matter of the horse Go Between, which won the Suburban handicap at Sheepshead Bay entered as a gelding and was subsequently proven to be a stallion on the ground that he was a stallion.

The trainers' license of John Shields, who handled Go Between, was revoked and all horses of the property of Alexander Shields, owner of Go Between, Ormond's Right, Halifax and other good performers, were disqualified for thirty racing days.

It was stated upon authority that there would be a further investigation in the Go Between case. Alexander Shields declined to make any comment for publication as to the punishment inflicted upon his son, Johnny, in connection with the Go Between matter. "I only hope that the public will bear in mind that as a trainer his record has been good and clean," Shields said with feeling.

The stewards of the Coney Island Jockey Club had the moral support of one of the stewards of the Jockey Club when they decided not to disqualify Go Between for the Suburban handicap by a proposed addition to rule 57, introduced by John H. Bradford, treasurer of the Coney Island Jockey Club, and a stockholder of the Jockey Club. It reads as follows: "No horse shall be disqualified on account of any error or violation of rule in the entry which might have been corrected on payment of a fine, but the stewards may inflict fines upon or otherwise deal with any persons responsible for such errors."

Thomas Hitchcock Jr. has proposed a rule, which, if adopted, would permit the stewards of a meeting to punish riders for foul riding or for lack of consideration for the safety of others without disqualifying the jockey's mounts. This is aimed to check Miller, Radtke and others.

LOGISTILLA RUNS FIRST.

Takes the Handicap at Brighton After a Game Struggle Run.

NEW YORK, July 13.—There was no stake feature on the card offered by the Brighton Association for decision this afternoon. The best race on the card was the fourth event, an overnight handicap for three-year-olds and upward at a mile and a sixteenth. Only one made a start, being backed from 2 to 1 to 3 to 2. He was never in the running, however, and finished a half fourth. The race was won by Logistilla, a 4 to 2 shot. Aeronaud raced to the front and opened up a gap of half a dozen lengths on the field, which quickly strung out. Grenade laid second to the far turn, where Logistilla took second place and was coming strong. Logistilla got Aeronaud in the stretch, taking the lead and came away, winning easily by three lengths.

There was a different story to tell, though, in the stretch, for when McBride sat down to ride Gorgalette the mare ran over the leader, winning as she pleased in close to track record time.

A plunge on Queen Cup to win the third race cut the mare's odds from fifty down to twenty. She ran fourth. Titus, the favorite, tucked this race away in his inside pocket without ever being extended. Belle Kinney was left. Old Epicure separated the talent from a bunch of its wealth by finishing second to Little Joker for the fourth number. 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PROMINENT TURFMAN, DISCIPLINED BY JOCKEY CLUB STEWARDS, AND HORSE WHICH HAS CAUSED MUCH TROUBLE.

Entries and Selections.

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AMATEUR BOXING IS DROPPED BY OFFICIALS.

Boxing was dropped from the list of sports controlled by the Pacific Athletic Association and in future no sanctions for exhibitions will be granted to clubs. Such action was taken at a meeting of the association at the Olympic Club last night without a dissenting voice.

Herbert Hauser of the Century Athletic Club brought the matter up and was the father of the resolution that ends, as far as the association is concerned, the four-round professional fights that have been held about the city for years under the guise of amateur boxing bouts.

Hauser said that the so-called amateur boxing had given a black eye to the association and that it was a well known fact that boys will not box for the \$35 trophies provided for in the amateur rule.

He stated that he was certain that at the last show sanctioned by the association, that which took place on the bench on July 4, Lew Powell and William Wolff received a purse of \$150.

He added that President Macabee of the Amateur Athletic Union had advised the association to remedy the whole matter by dropping boxing, and explained that while many of the boxing clubs helped to support the association, the time had come to consider that the one-sport club was a detriment to amateur sport.

WILL PROMOTE FIELD SPORTS.
He advocated the devotion of time to clean sport, such as track and field events, cross country runs and regattas. He suggested that if any club desired to go into the boxing business let it hold professional contests after dropping out of the association.

Director Paul Graves of the Olympic Club said he could safely say the directors of that club were heartily in favor of such action as proposed by Mr. Hauser. When President T. I. Fitzpatrick put the motion it was unanimously adopted.

The association was just as unanimous in passing a resolution giving permission to Al Coney, who is an enthusiast on amateur sports, to take a track team to New York to compete in the American Athletic Union championships in September. The aggregation will be known as the Greater San Francisco Track Team, and will compete with the full sanction of the P. A. A.

There was no objection to the team going East to compete, but the Olympic Club officials wanted it distinctly understood that it should not be known as the Olympic Club team and that in the collection of any funds to further the project it should not be made to appear that the famous club was soliciting aid.

In accordance with these views, the directors of the Olympic Club passed the following resolution at a meeting which preceded that of the association:

Resolved, That it is the sense of the board of directors of this club that it forbids any member of said club from forming any team of athletes for the purpose of participating in athletic games and regattas, as such a team is an Olympic Club team, and any member from so selling prizes, purses or money to anyone from any one in the name of the Olympic Club without the authority of this board and under the seal and signature of the president and secretary.

TRACK TEAM FOR THE EAST.
Al Coney, who was present when the resolution was presented to the association, as well as the long distance runner, Andrew Glarner, informed the body that there was no intention on their part or on the part of any others connected with the projected trip east to represent the team as one from the Olympic Club.

As Glarner and Plaw, two of the proposed crack track team, are members of the Olympic Club they must now get permission from that organization to go east and compete in its colors. Coney is an enthusiastic as ever despite the passing of the resolution, and says that it was not the intention to seek funds in the name of the Olympic Club, but in the name of the team which will represent the organization. Those who love amateur sport can help the team along if they see fit, and he is satisfied that the sanction of the Pacific Athletic Association is sufficient to show the public that the Olympic Club is in no way interested in the event as far as the gathering of any funds for the trip east is concerned. He also feels confident that as a great athletic organization the Olympic Club will readily refuse Plaw and Glarner permission to compete east when it finds that its resolution is in no way violated.

BRIGHTON HANDICAP FIELD.
Twelve Horses Will Face the Starter for the \$25,000 Purse.

NEW YORK, July 13.—Twelve horses of average class are named to compete today in the Brighton handicap, the richest of the all-aged events of the metropolitan summer racing season. The race, which is run over the seaside course of the Brighton Beach Racing Association, has a guaranteed cash value of \$25,000, of which the winner takes \$20,000, the second horse \$3000 and the third \$2000.
