"GIVE US HOUSES," IS OAKLAND CRY.

Families Searching for Residences and Merchants Look for Stores REALTY IS ACTIVE

OAKLAND, July 22.—"We want more houses for rent, no matter whether cottages, bungalows or larger dwellings—we can rent anything," is the cry of Oakland real estate dealers.

The same condition exists in regard to stores and offices, there being a much larger demand for business locations than can be filled by local real estate men.

The great increase in the business life of Oakland is clearly demonstrated by the fact that within the last month many new buildings, which, when completed will be used as stores, office buildings and warehouses, have been contracted for.

Excavation for the foundation of the new building to be erected by Dr. Samuel Kahn at the northeast corner of San Pablo avenue and Sixteenth street, has been completed and within a few days the laying of the foundation will begin.

That the erection of business buildings is not to be confined to the downtown district is proven by preparations now being made for the erection of a 140,000 brick business structure at East Fourteenth street and Thirteenth avenue.

Alameda, Berkeley and Emeryville are also receiving their full share of the general prosperity of the bay shore section of Alameda County, as evidenced by the large number of new buildings, both business and residence, now in course of construction in these communities.

Many new dwellings are also in course of construction in the Encinal City, and property owners are hastening the completion of these structures to meet the largely increased demand for homes.

Berkeley real estate men report the same difficulty experienced by Oakland dealers in securing a sufficient number of houses to rent to satisfy the demands of home-seekers, and property owners in Berkeley are likewise now realizing that more houses are an absolute necessity.

In Emeryville several new factories in course of construction will soon be in operation, and the employes of these manufacturing plants have for some time past been seeking homes near their places of employment.

The work of construction on a large warehouse for Walter S. Mackey, which is to be located on Park avenue at the head of Hubbard street, is to be commenced in a few days. The lot was secured from the Realty Syndicate and the new building will be 266 feet long by 100 feet wide.

The McGee tract on Allison way, between California and McGee streets, in Berkeley, is just now attracting much attention from investors seeking home sites for homes, and the tract has been placed on the market, it is confident that it will soon be entirely sold out.

OAKLAND, July 22.—Miss Enid Yale, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles G. Yale, became the bride at noon today of Consul General Wilbur Tirrell Gracey of Tsing Tau, China.

Only the immediate family was present at the ceremony and the breakfast that followed, but from 4 to 5 the bride received the congratulations of almost 200 friends, mostly from the younger set, who had been given this opportunity to meet her husband and bid her farewell at the same time.

Before settling down to his consular duties at Tsing Tau Mr. Gracey will spend some time in China, so, though the pre-nuptial days have been so strenuous, they will enjoy an ideal honeymoon. Within a day or so after his arrival here on the Albatross Mr. Gracey left for Washington, remaining there only twenty-four hours, and was in Oakland again Thursday last.

The position of Consul General at Tsing Tau is heavily coveted, for there was much official business to occupy Mr. Gracey's attention, aside from the all-important issue of getting married. Mr. Gracey is probably the youngest Consul General in years in Uncle Sam's service.
