Demands of the Boxer Nelson's Terms for a Match Are Pronounced Reasonable

Morris Levy Goes to Negotiate for Bout By R. A. Smyth.

MORRIS LEVY, representing the far-famed, if inharmonious, fight trust, leaves today for the East armed with authority to make the best available match to be decided in this city on September 10.

He will go at once to Omaha, where he will open negotiations with Nelson for a match with Gans for the championship. This will be the first definite step looking to the bringing together of the rival lightweights.

The diplomatic courier of the trust has an easy mission before him unless the galleas Eddie Graney has been basely deceived.

"This match can be made without any difficulty," Graney said yesterday.

The terms demanded by Nelson are reasonable. They will be acceptable to Gans, as he is willing to fight for a hundred dollars. He feels this would be the biggest event in his career and he wants to emerge from it creditably.

"I am not at liberty to make public the terms Nelson wants, but they are not a bar to the making of the match."

Graney made the statement yesterday that the fight would be handled by the trust. In this case Nelson will probably cut out Manager Jim Coffroth and transact his share of the business with Graney.

From the start it has been the opinion of the sports that the differences among the promoters has not been of so serious a nature as to keep them apart when a big gate money proposition is in view.

If no squabble developed over the referee the proposed fight would undoubtedly draw the largest attendance ever at a Queensberry ringside. The promoters appreciate all this and are ready to forget their petty differences.

Eddie Graney thinks the match would advertise to the world that the sporting blood still courses in the veins of the men here, notwithstanding the trials through which they have passed.

Al Kaufmann may be pitted against wild old Bob Fitzsimmons for a six-round bout in Philadelphia. Kaufmann is chafing under his enforced absence from the ring caused by the lack of an opponent, although he bars no one. The following dispatch tells the story:

Tommy Burns, who won a doubtful title to the championship from Marvin Hart, has passed up the present stars of the heavy-weight division and has taken on Hugo Kelly. According to the following, they are to meet in the south:

LOS ANGELES, July 26.—Tommy Burns and Hugo Kelly have been matched to fight twenty rounds before the Pacific Athletic Club in Los Angeles. Final papers were signed this afternoon.

The men will weigh in at 165 pounds at 6 o'clock on the day of the contest. The date has not been fixed, but it will probably be either August 21 or September 4. This will be Burns' first real engagement since he won the heavy-weight title from Marvin Hart.

"His agreement to make 165 pounds is a concession to Kelly and may be to the latter's advantage, as Burns fights best at 175 pounds. Negotiations for the contest have been on for some time, but the matter was not made public until the signatures of both men had been secured to the papers. Kelly will train here and Burns in the north."
