BUILDING RECORDS SHOW PROGRESS.

Eighty-Two Permits Are Issued During One Week in Oakland

OAKLAND, July 29.—Positive evidence of the rapid growth of this city since the earthquake is furnished by the record of the last week of the office of the City Building Inspector.

Following is a detailed statement of the character of the new buildings for which permits have been issued in the last week: One store, thirty-eight-one-story cottages, one one-and-a-half-story cottage, twelve two-story cottages, four stables, seven sheds, two storehouses.

NEW FRUITVALE FIRM.


