Kaufmann Wins in the Fifth Big Californian Scores a Decisive Victory.

Nevada Clubmen Confident of Outcome.

OLDFIELD, Aug. 7.—Joe Gans arrived here at 9:15 this evening and is awaiting impatiently the arrival of Billy Nolan. The latter will come in on the evening train tomorrow with Tex Rickard, who has gone to Reno to meet him and Eddie Graney.

It is expected that Jim Jeffries will be here to attend the fight. It is not likely he will be asked to act as referee owing to his differences with Nolan.

It is believed no hitch can arise to prevent the carrying out of the plans of the club. On the return of several of the members from vacations today the Goldfield Athletic Club was reorganized as follows:

President, Tex Rickard; vice president, Benjamin Rosenthal; treasurer, H. T. Bragdon; secretary, Ole Elliott; directors, N. A. Ingalls, Jack Campbell, L. L. Patrick and A. D. Myers.

Upon arrival of Nolan the articles of agreement will be signed, after which the construction of the big pavilion will be begun at once. Both principals have expressed themselves as satisfied with the purse offered and with all the conditions thus far outlined by the club.

GANS MAIN TAINS UNCONCERN AS TO TERMS.

OLDFIELD, Aug. 7.—I am here to fight and will leave all arrangements to Nolan. There will be no bickering on my part. All I want is a fair and square deal, and I hope the best man wins. I will make the fight easily and be good and strong. I will agree to any division of the purse, even to winner take all. The only demand I shall make is that we both train here at Goldfield.

DISOBEDIENT RUNS FIRST BUT IS PUT BACK.

SARATOGA, N. Y., Aug. 7.—The card arranged by the Saratoga Racing Association for decision at the Spa track this afternoon lacked the class of the opening day programme. Only one stake feature graced the afternoon card. That was the Mohawk, a selling stake for three-year-olds at one mile and an eighth.

The field was made up of three starters, of which McKittredge was a hot choice at 3 to 2. Disobedient won by a head. Yard was six lengths away. Disobedient was disqualified for crossing Yard on the first furlong and the race was given to McKittredge, with Yard second. The talent received a hard hit in the third race. They backed Puritan Girl heavily, and at post time the latter was a 7 to 5 favorite. The Whitney filly was practically left at the post and finished last.

When Jockey Kosner was interrogated regarding the start he denied that the assistant starter held his filly at the post, but that she simply backed when Mars Cassidy released the barrier. He said she acted "green" at the starting post. John W. Rogers, her trainer, confirmed her waywardness by saying that she was inclined to be sluggish behind the webbing.

Billy Nolan, Battling Nelson's Manager, the Man Who Dominates the Fight Situation, and the Two Principals in the Coming Battle at Goldfield, Nev.

WITHIN the next twenty-four hours The Call will have received the \$30,000 check of the Goldfield Athletic Club. This is the first of the important details of the proposed Gans-Nelson match to be disposed of, as Nolan will not make the match until he is advised that the actual coin has been posted.

The word of the Goldfield men is as good as their bond, but Nolan cannot afford to have any vain regrets. He is responsible to Nelson, and must make no mistake which would injure his man financially or in the campaign he maps out for him in the ring. Gans reached Goldfield yesterday. He is anxious to have both Nelson and himself train there. Friends of the Hegewisch man believe he will locate his camp near Reno, where he can enjoy trout fishing and possibly an occasional trip after deer to vary the monotony of training.

Trainload of Lumber Is Ordered for Arena
A trainload of lumber will leave Reno this morning, which will be used in the construction of the arena at Goldfield. This indicates the earnestness of the Nevada promoters and their enterprise.

The sporting men of this city have abandoned all hope of witnessing the big fight in an arena here, but they are of one mind in the matter of having some fight. The engagement at Goldfield will be decided on September 3. It is expected to attract sporting men from all parts of the country, and the majority of them will undoubtedly want to visit this city. As they are on a boxing pilgrimage, an attractive bout would be an inducement for them to come here.

Promoters Seek a Match for This City
There are three boys in the lightweight class who are available. These are Britt, Hanlon and Hyland. Britt can have the match if he says the word, and then the selection of an opponent would rest with the promoters. Eddie Hanlon has been anxious for a match with Britt for some time. In anticipation of getting the fight he has secured training quarters at Shannon's, where he will do light work until he learns what the future has in store for him.

Graney discussed the possibility of a match with Hyland, whom he met on Monday at Salt Lake. The promising young boxer jumped at the offer as a hungry trout strikes at a gaudily bedecked fly.

Dick Hyland Is Coming Up With a Rush
Hyland is a second Battling Nelson. If he improves at the same rate as he has shown during the last two years it will not be long before he will be a challenger for the lightweight championship.

Eddie Graney is due here today unless he stops over at Reno to witness the signing of the Gans-Nelson articles. He is ambitious to promote a fight here on Admission day, and will waste no time in deciding on a match once he settles down to business. Time is pressing, as there are many details to be decided after a match is made.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7.—Harry Baker of San Francisco, amateur featherweight champion, and Frankie Neil, bantam-weight champion of America, fought twenty fierce rounds before the Pacific Athletic Club here tonight and Baker was awarded the decision. Tommy Burns refereed the bout. His verdict in favor of Baker was loudly cheered by the immense crowd in the auditorium. When the decision was rendered against Neil stood in the center of the ring dumfounded. He then rushed to his corner, loudly protesting and denouncing the decision. "I was robbed," he said. "I forced the fight all the way and I have been robbed of it."

SEALS TAKE GAME FROM ANGELS AT OAKLAND.

Spencer landed on the first ball Bergemar pitched at Idora Park yesterday afternoon, and by the time Bernard had returned the ball to the diamond Spencer was roosting on third. He then scored on Wheeler's out to left. Kid Mohler tore off a single to center. He gained second on Hildebrand's out and reached home on Irwin's three-bagger to center. 

Los Angeles, Aug. 7.—Al Kaufmann, the California heavy-weight boxer, knocked out Fred Bradley of Roxbury in the fifth round of their scheduled fifteen-round bout tonight at the Lincoln Club, Chelsea. The Boston sporting fraternity, white as extravagant in their praise of the Pacific Coast fighter, declare that he was at all times the master of the man who faced him. Bradley had the benefit of the experience of Jack Johnson, and in many ways indicated that with more knowledge of the game, backed by his rugged physique, he will show up well later.

Kaufmann at the opening of the battle tried out Bradley, who rushed and was nervous, leaving bad openings. Neither scored any advantage in this round. In the second Kaufmann showed he had a wicked left hand, settling Bradley's head back several times. Bradley's winks went wild though he blocked several wicked swings of the Westerner, but at the close of the round showed he feared his opponent.

The third round was fast. The men fought all over the ring, the advantage being decidedly in favor of Kaufmann when they started in swapping punches. The fourth round opened with Bradley the aggressor, and Kaufmann had to back away. Clinches were frequent on breakaways. Kaufmann started in to finish Bradley quickly and had him

holding on when the bell rang. From the tap of the gong in the fifth round Kaufmann went after Bradley, who was powerless in his hands, being driven to his own corner under heavy punches. Hardy a minute and a half had been fought when a right-hand swing on the jaw sent him down for the count.

By winning his bout with Bradley Kaufmann has a chance to fight Tommy Burns at Tom McCarey's Pacific A. C. Los Angeles, September 4, and he will also be given a chance against Marvin Hart at the Lincoln Club later next month.

The promoters want to match Honey McRody and Joe Thomas for Labor Day. Their respective managers, Johnny Mooney and Harry Foley, are willing.

DOG SHOW EXPERT DUE SOON ON A VISIT.

The officials of the San Francisco Kennel Club and of the Pacific advisory board are preparing for the forthcoming visit of Secretary A. P. Vredenburg of the American Kennel Club. President J. E. de Ruyter of the Kennel Club is in communication with Secretary Butler and the other members of the club, preparing to give the visitor a hospitable reception.

Mr. Vredenburg, who is a noted authority on dog shows, will remain here a week and will then depart for Honolulu to attend the first dog show of the Hawaiian Kennel Club. He will remain in the islands about ten days.

Plan Big Arena to Seat Many Thousands.

RENO, Aug. 7.—Tex Rickard, promoter of the Gans-Nelson fight, arrived in Reno tonight and will be met here by Billy Nolan tomorrow. They will leave together for Goldfield on the Tonopah express. Gans preceded them and on the arrival of Nelson's manager articles of agreement will be signed.

Nolan wires ahead that all possibility of the fight being held in San Francisco or in any other place except Goldfield is eliminated as the result of an all day conference between Eddie Graney and himself. Nolan accepts the \$30,000 offer and will not make any terms with Graney. He says Nelson will fight in Goldfield.

BIG ARENA PLANNED.
A train of lumber will leave Reno tomorrow morning for Goldfield and an arena will be built capable of seating 20,000 people. Already a request has been received for a reservation of 500 seats for the society ladies of Goldfield. The prices of these seats will be \$20, \$15 and \$5.

Tex Rickard said tonight: "I wired Billy Nolan in Salt Lake City a few days ago that I would offer a purse for Nelson and Gans. At that time I did not have the money, but within one hour after receiving his reply the full amount was subscribed by Goldfield business men. I told the fighters that I represented the Goldfield Athletic Club. No such club was formed at that time, but since my arrival in Reno I have telegraphed representatives in Goldfield to form a club and to elect me president and treasurer. I hope this will fill the requirements. I do not anticipate any disagreement when Billy Nolan and Gans meet with me in Goldfield to sign the articles of agreement."

Racing Dates Are Extended.
LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 7.—The State Racing Board met here today and granted the Latonia Jockey Club an extension in dates from August 13 to September 1. A license was issued to Douglas Park for September 2 to September 15, and from September 24 to September 29. The Louisville Jockey Club was given dates from October 1 to October 29.

Olympic Club Officers.
