

SANTA CLARA, Oct. 27.—Maids and matrons, clergymen and citizens of Santa Clara—in fact, just every one in town, has worked earnestly to make the benefit bazaar for the Sodality Athletic Association a financial success. The bazaar was formally opened Wednesday evening by D. O. Druffel, Mayor of Santa Clara. Among those present was Rev. Father Cunningham, founder of the club, who arrived from Mexico last Saturday evening. He was met by several hundred students and escorted from the depot by the college brass band.

MORE TROOPS SENT AFTER THE UTES.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 27.—According to advices received by the Wyoming State officials, the War Department has decided to take no chances in rounding up the band of Ute Indians and has dispatched an entire regiment of 1000 men to capture the Utes. The two troops of the Tenth Cavalry first sent out have been reinforced by four more troops of the Second Regiment from Fort Robinson and six troops of the same regiment from Fort Robinson. Six troops of the Sixth Cavalry have been ordered from Fort Meade, under Colonel Hughes, to reinforce the troops already in the field. The cavalry is marching overland from South Dakota toward Powder River, where the Indians are camped, and will probably join the Tenth Cavalry near the camp and surround the redskins. It has been decided if the Utes surrender to place them on one of the agencies south of the Black Hills until spring, and then take them back to their reservation in Utah.

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Oct. 27.—Two companies left for the Mackenzie today, going north, and it is generally believed that they have gone to intercept the Ute Indians in case they attempt to reach the Cheyenne agency before the arrival of the cavalry from Fort Meade.

Old timers here say that should the Utes reach the Cheyennes they would fire that band into revolt and a serious war would result. The Cheyennes are hard fighters and have given the Government much trouble.

The second detachment of cavalry sent out from Fort Robinson left Gillette about midnight and unloaded this morning at Kendrick, three miles from Arvada. They had instructions from the department to "march close on the heels of the Indians," but not to fire unless absolutely necessary. They will await the arrival of the troops from Fort Meade before making a demonstration.

The Indians camped last night about sixty miles northeast of Sheridan. Chief Kannapph says they will not go back. Beyond killing stock for food and robbing an occasional sheep camp, the Indians are committing no depredations.

MONEY MARKET IS STILL STRONG.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Transactions were not large in the two hours' session of the stock market today. The market was under pressure for a time during the first part of the session, apparently of speculative liquidation, but this was completed before the appearance of the bank statement. Its publication brought a recovery, especially in United States Steel, and prices were bid up sharply. The closing was in consequence strong, but only moderately active. The bank returns show a reduction of \$27,634,000 in the deposit item, and with this upward of \$20,000,000 was in the credit account.

The time money market was reported strong today, but money makers reported that they were offering again against sterling loans. The foreign exchange market was weak and discounts eased in London. The Bank of England shipped \$1,275,000 to Egypt, but a consignment of over \$5,000,000 of South American gold arrived in England.

Total sales of bonds, par value, \$462,000. At the opening this week there was a spasmodic recovery from the demoralized break in prices at the close of last week's market.

The course of foreign money markets has sent stocks into this market for sale, and there has been some speculative liquidation also for domestic account. Large operators have been out of the market, and banking interests were credited with a sentiment adverse to the present speculative activity. When prices advanced they met free offerings. The desire to await the passing of elections was in part the supposed motive for this attitude, as it was supposed to be the cause of laying aside of some important projects which were the subject of rumors in the past and were relied upon to stimulate speculative activity. There were some other developments of the week calculated to repress speculative activity, although most of them were the result of the high pressure of prosperous activity in all departments of business. Such were the formulated demands upon the railroads by organized bodies of their employees for higher wages and shorter hours. Another result of the country's enormous traffic was felt in the growing shortage of freight cars, which has become so marked as to threaten serious blockades and shortage of material for carrying on production in some important lines. Grain men complain that some of the railroads companies refuse to receive grain for transportation, putting them in an embarrassing position to meet contracts for delivery. The iron trade reports a scarcity of iron for delivery, and the pressure for early delivery of copper also continues.

Most important of the facilities for commerce of which the available supply shows indications of strain is money. The main pressure has shifted to foreign money markets, but the effect is transmitted through all markets by the medium of the exchanges. Notwithstanding the drastic measure of a 5 per cent official discount rate which was adopted last week, this week's return of the banks shows a decline again in the proportion of reserve to liability, both by decrease in bullion holdings and by increase in loans. Its reserve continues near the \$90,000,000 level, which is regarded in itself as a danger line for this season of the year.

TRIES TO SHOOT A RELATIVE BUT HIT HIMSELF IN ARM

Brother of Former Congressman E. J. Livernash Gives Exhibition of Poor Marksmanship. SANTA ROSA, Oct. 27.—Considerable excitement was created in Healdsburg last night by a report that William Livernash, brother of former Congressman Edward J. Livernash of San Francisco, had shot and killed A. Koenig, a relative by marriage. It developed, however, that Livernash had only attempted to shoot Koenig, and in so doing had shot himself in the arm. The wound is not dangerous and Livernash will soon be about as usual. Koenig's father married Miss Lizzie Livernash, sister of the ex-Congressman.
