The rest of the first half was marked by several sensational stunts. Knox, Lick's quarter, made a quarterback sneak for twenty yards, and distinguished himself a few minutes later by running in a punt twenty-five yards.

The heavy work of the rival boxers is generally fit to do himself credit in order to satisfy their many admirers, who are sure to turn out for a last glimpse at their favorite.


