ESHELMAN BE MADE DEPUTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY

District Attorney Elect of Alameda County Names Men for His Assistants

OAKLAND, Dec. 12.—Assemblyman-elect John M. Eshelman of Berkeley will be one of the deputy district attorneys to be appointed the first of the year by District Attorney-elect Brown, according to the statement made today by Brown. Eshelman is a graduate of the University of California and a deputy State Labor Commissioner under Commissioner Stafford and has devoted himself with vigor to the enforcement of the child labor law. He will not assume office as a deputy district attorney until the close of the next session of the Legislature.

Miss David fell clear of the wreckage, but her father was forced over the rough macadam for some distance by the car. He sustained a laceration of the scalp and a fracture of one of the fingers of his right hand. After being given medical attention David was able to go to his home, 1223 Pacific avenue. At the wedding of Miss David and Phillips this evening the Rev. L. Potter Hitchcock officiated. The groom is a young business man of Lodi, and it is there that Mr. and Mrs. Phillips will make their permanent residence. The bride is a graduate of the Alameda High School and has been popular in the affairs of the younger social set.

TO TRY AGAIN TO CURB RIVER
IMPERIAL, Dec. 12.—Preliminary work was begun this morning by the Southern Pacific Railway Company for closing the break in the Colorado River. The contractors have been ordered for immediate delivery and vast quantities of piles will be rushed to the front. A meeting of all interests in the valley has been called to assemble tomorrow morning at Imperial to meet Superintendent R. H. Ingram and other representatives of the Southern Pacific Company, who will submit a proposition to the people of the valley to guarantee the company and the Mexican Republic against damage claims. In return for which the company will proceed on a larger scale than ever to control the river and build dykes to furnish absolute protection at all times. There is no doubt that a satisfactory agreement will be reached.

LINEMAN BADLY INJURED

OAKLAND, Dec. 12.—Henry Olsen, a telephone lineman, residing at 1886 Alcatraz avenue, in Berkeley, was seriously and perhaps fatally injured shortly after 9 o'clock this morning by being thrown forty feet to the ground by the breaking off of the top of a pole at Seventh and Wood streets on which he was working. Olsen's left leg was broken and he sustained internal injuries. He was removed to the Providence Hospital.

NEGROES FREED OF CHARGE

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 12.—A jury in the Superior Court today acquitted four negroes of the charge of murdering Police Officer James H. Hester during the September riots in Atlanta. It is likely that the charges pending against forty-six other negroes will be dismissed.

DEATH PENALTY ON EIGHT RUSSIANS
EKATERINOSLAV, South Russia, Dec. 12.—The court martial here today imposed the death sentence upon eight leaders of the armed uprising of December last, the object of which was the establishment of a military republic in Ekaterinoslav province. Many others who participated in the revolt were condemned to the mines for life.

SKIN OF NECK OF MURDERED WOMAN IS SHOWN IN COURT
Grossome Evidence Offered in the Trial of Ed Wilson for Homocide at Stockton
STOCKTON, Dec. 12.—A ghastly bit of evidence was offered by the prosecution today in the trial of Ed Wilson, charged with the murder of a hill woman of the half-world, in the shape of a section of cuticle from the neck of the dead woman, showing a knife wound. A blood-stained knife was found sewed up in the bottom of a leg of Wilson's trousers.

State Controller A. B. Nye was also present.
A question raised by William Ashe of the Good Roads Association regarding the increase of property values in the country following the construction of the roads was referred to a committee composed of J. HAU HAS NO IDEA OF SUICIDE

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Owing to the fact that the evidence regarding the death of Frau Molliter had not arrived here from Germany, Professor Karl Hau of Washington, who was accused of murdering the woman, his mother-in-law, was again remanded for a week today. Hau is being closely watched, as the police fear that he may attempt suicide. The prisoner, however, assured his counsel that he had no such intention. The prisoner this morning made application to the magistrate for \$350 with which to pay creditors in Washington, who, he said, are pressing him. The magistrate promised to consider the application.

TO SET DATE FOR HANGING OF MURDERER LEON SODER
On motion of Assistant District Attorney James Hanley, Judge Cook has ordered Leon Soder, now in San Quentin for the murder of Joseph Blaise, to be brought before him December 17, at which time the court will set the date for Soder's hanging. The order was made yesterday morning by Judge Cook.
Soder killed Blaise, his brother-in-law, on January 10, 1904, near the corner of Taylor and Vallejo streets, for the purpose of securing his life insurance. Soder was an ex-convict, and after having been released from prison went to Germany and brought Blaise back to this country with him. He then had Blaise take out heavy life insurance payable to him, and on the night of the murder plied him with liquor and led him to the place where the killing occurred.
Soder was once sentenced to hang, but secured a stay of execution and appealed his case to the Supreme Court, which recently confirmed his conviction and ordered the execution to be carried out.

OAKLAND, Dec. 12.—Mrs. Andrew Cunningham, whose 17-year-old daughter, Estelle B. Cunningham, eloped from this city last Saturday with Harry Holly, a race track follower, this morning swore to a complaint charging her daughter with petty larceny. The eloping pair were arrested in Los Angeles and Holly has already been charged with child-stealing. The girl declared that she would not return to the home of her mother, and the latter then filed a complaint against her, to enable the police to bring her back to Oakland. The specific crime charged against Miss Cunningham by her mother is the theft of a gold watch, but it is not believed that the girl will be prosecuted on this charge, it being the intention of Mrs. Cunningham simply to furnish the police with legal grounds on which to return the girl to Oakland.

PORTLAND PAIR MARRY

ON QUIET AT MARTINEZ
Howard S. Johnston and Lily Coffin by Appointment and Weds When Few Are Nigh
MARTINEZ, Dec. 12.—A romance of school days in Portland, Oregon, culminated in this city Saturday when Howard S. Johnston and Lily Coffin were married by Rev. M. J. Gough of the Methodist Episcopal church. Miss Coffin has been visiting friends at 1649 Everett street, Alameda, and her fiancé came to San Francisco on a business trip. He slipped into Martinez Saturday and obtained a marriage license.
Wishing to keep the union a secret, Miss Coffin directed that the marriage certificate be forwarded to Alameda in her maiden name. The officiating clergyman was enjoined to keep the matter as secret as possible, but the license register revealed the secret, and when seen at Alameda yesterday Mr. Johnston admitted her marriage, but explained that a complication of business matters in Portland occasioned her efforts to avoid publicity. Johnston returned to Oregon, but his fair bride will remain in Alameda.

WILL SEND JEWS TO THE WEST

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—Realizing the necessity of doing something to relieve congested conditions of the Jewish quarters of Chicago, New York and other large cities, leading New York Jews are planning to divert Jewish immigration to the West.
Jacob Schiff, the New York banker, who is in Chicago at the present time, discussed the subject yesterday with Judge Julian W. Mack. The plan contemplates the organizing of an association to be financed by Schiff and other leading American Jews, which will undertake to send Jewish immigration to the South and to the extreme western part of the country.
No effort will be made to encourage immigration, but all poor Jews who arrive in New York and other Atlantic ports will be given an opportunity to go to cities and towns in the South and West. To facilitate matters the association plans to establish agencies and bureaus of information at New York and at Galveston, Tex., and other gulf ports.

DISCUSS U. P. LINE INTO TACOMA

TACOMA, Dec. 12.—W. A. Irwin, John Spring and other San Francisco capitalists have bought 2400 acres adjoining Tacoma on the west and southwest. They will plat several high class suburban additions, paving the streets and providing sewage and a water supply before putting the property on the market. They have platted similar additions in past years to San Francisco, Oakland and Seattle. Irwin is here to start operations. Two hundred men are clearing and grading the first tract to be surveyed, situated on the steam-car line. Irwin is president of the Narrows Company, to which their property has been transferred.

WASHINGTON LEADS IN SHINGLES

TACOMA, Dec. 12.—Seven billion shingles have been cut and marketed this year in Washington by 450 shingle mills, having an aggregate daily capacity exceeding 300,000,000 shingles, or over ten billion yearly. Statistics compiled by the State Shingle Bureau show that no other State now cuts or exceeds one billion shingles a day. The market for red cedar shingles extends all over the United States. Rail shipments alone of lumber and shingles from Washington this year will exceed 100,000 carloads.
