

LOCATES DAUGHTER IN ARIZONA

Mrs. A. E. Herbst Receives Letter Telling Where- abouts of Missing Child FATHER DISAPPEARS

SANTA ROSA, Dec. 16.—Mrs. A. E. Herbst, who came here from Oakland with her two young sons last May and was deserted by her husband, has, after months of anxiety, located her 11-year-old daughter Galdys, whom the father took with him when he decamped. A letter received by Mrs. Herbst from Attorney J. W. Ross of El Paso, Tex., informed her that her daughter has been provided with a temporary home by that gentleman's wife.

At El Paso Herbst went under the name of Gus Miller and it is said that he left there for El Paso, Tex. Mrs. Herbst, who was left destitute here, has been cared for by the Women of the World of Oakland and the relief committee in this city.

Mrs. Herbst has contended that her husband had lost his mind. She is now more firmly convinced of this, as Herbst had a special aversion to the south.

The disappearance of Herbst and his daughter had been called to the attention of the police in hope of getting trace of their whereabouts. The Oakland Women are also seeking to locate Herbst, so that in case of his death the family may have the necessary proof to obtain the insurance he carries.

SEATTLE WORKMEN ABHOR ASIATICS

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE CALL.

SEATTLE, Dec. 16.—At a meeting of the Central Labor Council of Seattle and vicinity last night resolutions were passed protesting against further immigration of Mongolian labor of all kinds, specifically mentioning Japanese and Korean, on the ground that the wages and living standard of such labor are dangerous and destructive of American citizenship.

Colonization by Orientals on the Pacific slope was said to be a threatening danger to domestic peace as well as to the friendly relations of the peoples concerned.

Much sympathy was extended the people of San Francisco in their position against admitting Japanese in the schools with American children. The President's stand in the matter was denounced as "brutal and un-American." One speaker went so far as to intimate that the chief executive courted civil strife in declaring for such a policy.

Just before the resolutions were passed there was strife between some Socialist agitators and labor people, the former trying to capture the meeting. A Socialist speaker was asked to leave the hall and was followed by a few who had come there for the purpose of creating sentiment in favor of socialism by speeches against the naturalization policy.

LAD FALLS IN FIT, SHOOTS FRIEND

The victim of a most peculiar accident, 16-year-old Arthur Kennedy, whose home is at the corner of Madison and Sellman streets, is lying at the City and County Hospital in a critical condition.

Young Kennedy, in company with Wendall Fritz, a boy of about his own age, spent yesterday morning hunting for squirrels on the University Heights above Mission road, and about noon the two started home. Kennedy was in front and the other boy, carrying a rifle, followed close behind, when the latter fell down in a fit, discharging the weapon.

The bullet struck the Kennedy youngster in the back, inflicting a very serious wound. The injured lad was hurried to the hospital in a patrol wagon and the lad who was carrying the rifle was taken to the Mission station, pending an investigation, but was released on the statement of his father, Dr. J. A. Fritz of 14 Academy street, who said that his son was subject to epilepsy.

REAR ADMIRAL LYON'S PAY WILL BE LARGELY INCREASED

Listed as First Official of His Rank to Receive Benefit of Better Pay

VALLEJO, Dec. 16.—Next February Rear Admiral Henry W. Lyon, commandant at Mare Island, will become one of the first nine rear admirals in the American navy and will receive an increase in salary of \$2000 per annum, which will make his pay \$7500. Lyon will not reach the age of retirement until November, 1907. His retirement will mean an advancement all along the line for the higher naval officers.

WAGER OF BEER DRINKER STARTS A FATAL FIGHT

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 16.—A quarrel over a wager as to his ability to drink twelve glasses of beer resulted in a fight in the Rome saloon this evening, in which Domenico Diparto, an Italian laborer, shot and mortally wounded his cousin, Giovanni Marra, after the latter had stabbed him so severely that he may die.

TWO DARING HIGHWAYMEN HOLD UP AND ROB FERRYMAN

REDDING, Dec. 16.—Two unmasked highwaymen called Ferryman, released on the opposite side of the river last night and while one of them covered him with a pistol the other took \$500 from his pockets. They then commanded him to hurry back across the river, and he obeyed.

MEETS VIOLENT DEATH

REDDING, Dec. 16.—The body of a man was found alongside the railroad near Elmore yesterday. Whether he fell off the top of a car could not be learned. He was not run over. His neck and shoulders were broken.


