Cockey O'Brien, true to the traditions of his race, carried the harp and the shamrock to victory in the ring last night and trailed the dragon flag of China in the dust of the roped arena.

All the judges decided in favor of the Irish champion, which might have been expected as their names were McDevitt, Fitzgerald, Roche and Daily. At that, they did not have to strain a point, as O'Brien was willing to do all the fighting, although his aldermanic proportions about the waist were somewhat of a handicap.

On two occasions both boxers went to the mat through their feet becoming entangled in the ropes. They were together the first time O'Brien, instead of shaking hands, nearly knocked his opponent's head off.

The good-natured spectators attracted a lot of fun from the bout between Tanglefoot McGovern and Tim Dunkin. Neither could box, and what blows Durkin tried were cleverly blocked by Tangle's face.

Johnny Murphy outpointed Jack McFadden cleverly after four hard fought rounds, and should have had the decision. Both judges gave it to Murphy, but the fighters had a private agreement that it would be a draw if both were on their feet.


