CONGRESS PETITIONED

R. S. Waddell Declares the United States Should Manufacture Explosives

CONGRESS PETITIONED

Robert S. Waddell, a powder manufacturer of Peoria, Ill., has petitioned the President and Congress to appropriate \$3,000,000 for the establishment of three powder mills, one on the Atlantic seaboard under the control of the Navy Department, another on the Pacific slope under the same branch of the service and a third in the Mississippi Valley or Middle West under authority of the War Department. In a brochure entitled "The Powder Conspiracy," issued by Waddell and circulated throughout the country, he charges that the United States would be in grave peril of a shortage of ammunition should war break out suddenly, a condition which, he declares, is due to the machinations of the powder trust, described by him as "an absolute and exclusive monopoly, superior to the Government, entrenched at the Capital, with its representatives in the House, Senate and departments."

In his communication Waddell sketches the history of the invention of smokeless powder, which was perfected at the naval torpedo station at Newport, R. I., by Lieutenant John B. Bernardou, U. S. N., and Commander George A. Converse, U. S. N., and is known as the Bernardou-Converse process. It is charged that those officers sold their patented formula to Charles A. Rutter, who subsequently transferred his rights to the process to the International Smokeless Powder and Dynamite Company of New Jersey, of which United States Senator Dupont is president. It is charged that this corporation has sold the powder to foreign nations and on that count Waddell strove to have the United States Supreme Court declare the patent to be null and void.

Now he insists that the powder trust is selling to the Army and Navy departments powder which costs 95 cents a pound for 84 1/2 cents, and furthermore that it is selling to the Government powder which it manufactures by which it requires six months of seasoning before the article is ready for use, it is stated that the nation would be inadequately supplied with powder should a war break out.

Waddell claims that the Dupont-International Company is a conspiracy acting in restraint of trade; that competition with the manufacture of powder is impossible owing to the patents it holds, and that it has been disloyal in selling powder to foreign nations. Government powder mills are declared to be necessities.
