Divorce is granted to Mrs. Warren Foote

Well-Known Real Estate Man Acused of Failure to Provide

Mrs. Anne N. Foote was granted a divorce by Judge Murasky yesterday from Warren C. Foote, formerly well known in real estate and mining circles in this city and now of Los Angeles, on the ground of failure to provide for her support.

Mrs. Foote has a considerable income in her own right and has wealthy sisters living in New York City and Ann Arbor, Mich., and did not ask for alimony. She stated that for the past years her husband had lived apart from her in Los Angeles and that she had received nothing from him, although she would not speak as to his present financial condition.

In connection with her testimony in court yesterday Mrs. Foote introduced as an exhibit a letter written by her husband's father in which the latter accused his son of loose habits and censured him for his connection with certain gambling houses.

OPPOSE HEIGHT LIMIT ON CLASS "A" BUILDINGS Business Men Urge Supervisors to Remove Restrictions

The Supervisors' fire committee heard arguments yesterday in favor of a numerous signed petition to remove the restriction in the building ordinance limiting the height of class A structures to one and a half times the width of the streets on which they are constructed.

Forty-five candidates were obligated at the last meeting of Laborers' Protective Union No. 894. Many applications are on file. A special meeting of the union will be held at Sheet Metal Workers' Hall next Tuesday.

A large and enthusiastic meeting was held Wednesday night by the new union, Electrical Mechanics of California No. 1. Many are joining at each meeting. The officers claim that there are over 500 members in the union.

Business Agent George L. Berry of Printing Pressmen's Union No. 24 visited Sacramento Wednesday and appeared before the meeting of Printing Pressmen's Union No. 60. Berry made such an impression with the Sacramento delegates that the resolutions he wished endorsed went through unanimously.

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WIFE OF PHOTOGRAPHER IS GRANTED A DIVORCE Marital Discord in Hahn Family Culminates in Suit

Marital discord, which led a year ago to the separation of George Habenicht, the photographer, from Mrs. Alice May Habenicht, his wife, and caused those intimate with the family affairs to expect a divorce action at any time, culminated yesterday when Mrs. Habenicht was granted an interlocutory decree of divorce on the ground of desertion.

The suit instigated by Mrs. Habenicht was prosecuted quietly, every endeavor being made to avoid publicity. The testimony was taken before a court commissioner and was merely a formal transaction, in which Habenicht did not appear to defend the charge brought against him.

Mrs. Habenicht did not ask for an alimony, and based her claim for a divorce entirely on the desertion, which occurred January 29, 1906. In her testimony before the court commissioner she said that the trouble between herself and her husband was largely due to the fact that she objected to his conduct toward others and neglect of her duties.

On the night before the final separation there was a quarrel and Habenicht told her, she says, that he would leave her, but she gravely threatened to sue him for desertion.
