A Missouri State inspector appointed by Governor Folk has discovered that beer and milk are twin sisters, and has made his discovery the subject of an official report. In this report beer is credited with a better and purer disposition than milk, for although the beer contains alcohol, milk is apt to harbor bacteria, from which beer is free.

He notes in his report that the people of Missouri, barred from indiscriminate indulgence in the draught article by Folk's strict enforcement of the laws, are becoming more friendly to bottled beer, and, to set the public conscience at rest, presents the following chemical analysis:

Milk—Per cent water, 87.79. Total solids (nutritious matter), 12.21. Milk sugar, 4.18. Fat, 3.74. Proteids, 3.72. Ash, .69.

Domestic beer—Per cent original extract or nutritious matter, 12.71. Sugar and dextrose, 3.27. Alcohol, 3.92. Proteids, .48. Ash, .25.

Let any skeptic take a given quantity of milk and beer, analyze the same, and more bacteria or foreign matter will be found in the milk than in the beer.

Governor Folk has contended that it is the purpose of the beer inspection law to give the consumer the purest article known under the name of "beer and other malt liquors."

### THINKS THE AUTOMOBILE HAS A GREAT FUTURE

#### Thomas Henderson of the Winton Factory Tells of Trade Outlook

Thomas Henderson, vice president of the Winton Motor Carriage Company, vice president of the Association of Licensed Automobile Manufacturers and vice president of the National Association of Automobile Manufacturers, arrived here yesterday on his first visit to the coast.

In discussing the automobile outlook in the United States, Henderson said: "I think that the output of 1908 cars, or at the latest the output of 1909 cars, will supply the demand. By this I mean that the manufacturers, as a whole, will have developed their factories to such an extent that when a purchaser wants a car he will be able to walk into an agency and get it without having to place his name on a waiting list. The capacity of all the manufacturers has been increased by the adoption of a standardization of parts.

"When the dull time comes we may expect to see a wonderful advancement in the motor truck. At present all the big factories are centering their efforts on the pleasure vehicle, as it is called, but in San Francisco and other places the motor trucks, I hear, are in great demand. There are some very good trucks being manufactured, but as the larger profit to be made out of the pleasure vehicles than out of the trucks not many of them are being manufactured.

"Some of the plants that are now turning out big cars will in a couple of years be in a position to build a car for \$500 or less that will carry one or two persons. It will be a twenty-five to thirty mile an hour car that can be used as a runabout by business men and it will take hills like you have in this city."

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### BILLY NOLAN DISCUSSES A GANS-NELSON FIGHT

#### Cannot Agree With Selig on the Question of the Men's Weight

Eddie Graney is after the next Gans-Nelson fight and made a bid yesterday of \$25,000 as a purse for the match. He stated that he would deposit a \$10,000 guarantee today, Graney wants to hold the fight in San Francisco, where, he declares, there is more money for a fight than in Nevada or any other portion of the country.

Graney's bid raises Tex Rickard, who wants the fight as an advertising boost for his mining camp of Ely, Nevada, by \$5000. Billy Nolan stated to the Call last night that he would sign in behalf of Nelson with the club or individual offering the largest purse, provided the arrangements regarding division of the purse and the weight were satisfactory. He stated that he would prefer to have the fight held in San Francisco, but that he would not sign with either Rickard or Graney until the field was fully canvassed and others had had a chance to raise the bid. He said he believes Nelson's manager will agree with Selig on what extra division appears most satisfactory, whether winner take all, 75 per cent to the winner and 25 per cent to the loser, or 60 per cent and 40 per cent. Nolan will, however, insist that Nelson have an even break with Gans and that no extra percentage be paid the colored man as a champion's share.

Nelson is at his home in Hegewisch and may be sent for by Nolan any day. Nolan states that he may make a match for his man before July, which is the longest time talked of for the Gans-Nelson match. Nolan expects to return to England in July to carry out arrangements made during his recent trip. Nelson is out of the hospital and is rapidly recovering from his throat trouble. In a telegram to The Call yesterday, he says:

### RETIRING CITY FATHERS SPEAK THEIR FAREWELLS

#### Newly Elected Councilmen to Take Seats at the Next Session

OAKLAND, March 21.—The present City Council met for the last time tonight. The newly-elected members of the council will take their seats at the next meeting. At the close of the session, President George Fitzgerald and Councilmen Meese, McAdam, Donaldson and Thurston, who retire, made felicitous farewells.

### FOLLOWED FROM SALOON BY THUGS AND ROBBED

#### George G. Stedman of the Standard Oil Steamer Atlas Is Victim of a Holdup

William Burke was arrested yesterday morning by Patrolman Potter and Goff and charged at the Central station with robbery. George G. Stedman, an officer on the Standard Oil Company's steamer Atlas, is the complaining witness, and lies at the Central Emergency Hospital, badly battered and bruised as a result of his alleged encounter with Burke and two of the latter's companions late Wednesday night.

Stedman claims he met Burke and two others in the Richelieu saloon and had a drink with them. He displayed a goodly sum of money when he paid for the drinks, and on leaving the saloon was accompanied by one of his newly found friends, while the other two came behind. On Grant avenue, near Market street, he was attacked by the two followers and beaten into insensibility while held by his companion. When he recovered consciousness he found he had been robbed of a gold watch and chain and \$45. He was picked up by the policemen and sent to the hospital.

On the description furnished by Stedman, William Burke was arrested and later was identified by the victim. The police are still after the other two crooks. Stedman is painfully but not seriously hurt.
