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AMATEUR BOXING GAME

Police Committee Hears Report to Supervise Issuance of Permits

The amateur boxing game is destined to receive serious setback if a resolution adopted yesterday's meeting of the Board of Supervisors is enforced. The resolution calls upon the Chief of Police to permit no amateur club to stage an exhibition unless it produce a permit countersigned by the police committee of the board.

The resolution is another evidence of dissension among the members of the board, due to the recent startling graft exposed by Supervisor Kelly addressed the board, saying that certain amateur clubs had been circulating petitions among the Supervisors and had obtained the signatures of ten or eleven of the Supervisors...

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SAYS SMATHERS TRIED TO BRIBE THE TRAINER

Spear Tells How Millionaire Sought to Defeat Lou Dillon

NEW YORK, April 1.—In an effort to recover from Elmer E. Smathers the gold cup won by his horse, Major Delmar, in a race with the trotting mare, Lou Dillon, at Memphis on October 13, 1904, the Memphis Trotting Association, as plaintiff, began today to lay before Justice Greenbaum, in a hurry to the Supreme Court, all facts connected with the alleged drugging of the mare as the result of a conspiracy planned by Smathers.

George W. Spear, employed by Smathers for more than five years as a trainer, took the stand at the opening of today's trial and testified that at Lexington, just prior to the Memphis meeting, Smathers had asked him to arrange with the trainer of Lou Dillon to have the mare beaten.

Just prior to the Memphis race Mr. Smathers asked me if I would not see "Ed" Sanders, a trainer of Lou Dillon, and find out what he would do to have Lou Dillon beaten. I spoke to Sanders and told him Mr. Smathers wanted to see the cup.
