

FARMERS CHARGE CARSON WITH DECEPTION
Carson River Irrigationists Say Exorbitant Rate Is Demanded
ATTORNEYS ENGAGED
To Contest Repudiation of Promise of Government Agents

RENO, April 30.—After being promised an inch of water for each acre of land that they had under cultivation in Churchill county as a consideration for giving up their water rights along the Carson river and allowing the government to tear up their canals and irrigating ditches for the purpose of constructing the Truckee-Carson reclamation project, the farmers of that district have been told by the secretary of the interior that he cannot accept the agreements signed by the land agents and that a charge of 10 cents an acre per year will be made for a maintenance fee.


SAYS THAT NO FACTION CONTROLS COMMITTEE
