Norman Eisner Wins Highest Honors and Will Be Proclaimed Class Medalist

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BERKELEY, May 14.—Parthians that tell the story of a triumphant passage through the ordeal of university examination, after four years of study in college halls, will be given tomorrow afternoon on the state of the Greek theater by the members of the class of 1907...

Norman Eisner will be proclaimed university medalist tomorrow afternoon, and to him will go the honor that accompanies the award of the medal given annually to the most distinguished graduate of the year. Eisner is of the college of social sciences. He has won the highest honors in jurisprudence. He has achieved fame as a college debater, winning the Carnot medal last year and gaining distinction in the intercollegiate debating contests. Students Observe Class Day at Berkeley With Pilgrimage and Speeches

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BERKELEY, May 14.—Traditions associated with class day at the university were duly observed today, when the members of the class of 1907, who will graduate tomorrow, conducted their annual pilgrimage through the campus and with song and speech celebrated the day.

The class pilgrimage began, as of old, at the senior oaks, near the Oxford street entrance to the campus. There J. A. Hartley, president of the senior class, spoke briefly, referring to the inspiration that comes to those who live in the shadow of the noble trees beneath which have walked in other years the men of the faculty and student body, whose names lend luster to the roster of the university.

At California hall the procession halted and R. H. Van Sant Jr. addressed the throng. The pride that university men feel in the noble structure called California hall was spoken of by Van Sant. He considered the hall to be the heart of the university, the sheltering as it does the executive officers, the administration machinery, and standing for the order and method which characterize the university's operations.

The agricultural college was discussed by Ralph P. Merritt, president of the associated students, who stood on the steps of the structure which students call "cow college," and voiced the esteem in which the branch called agricultural science is held at the university.

FRATERNITY RECEPTIONS. The fraternity houses all held receptions during the afternoon hours, and tonight the senior extravaganza was produced on the stage of the Greek theater. The spectacle attracted a crowd which packed the theater to overflowing. Honors were won by the producers of the show and by its authors. Miss Isabel McReynolds and Harold A. Clark.
