Four bells, telling the hour of 10 o'clock p. m., had just sounded when the princess burst into the cabin of the night. Shrieking demands for the captain, the purser, the police and the militia smote the ears of those awake and roused sleepers from their slumbers.

Purser Hopkins and Captain Nopander hastened to the scene of disturbance and found two angry women, wearing night robes, armed with hairbrushes and umbrellas and making frantic efforts to keep what appeared to be a man out of their stateroom.

LOUIS TIAFF JUMPS OFF WHARF INTO OOZE AND IS RESCUED WITH BOAT HOOK



Secretary of Their Union Says They Are Ready for Long Fight.

WANT HIGHER WAGES

Declare That the Owners Are Able to Pay the Increase Asked

"If it takes us five years, as it did the brewery workers' union in St. Louis, to win this fight, we will win it," said Secretary A. H. Hohmann of brewery workers' local 277 yesterday afternoon.

The men are entitled to their demands, and the brewery owners are amply able to pay the increased wages.

Our agreement expired last July, but the owners showed us how great had been their losses by the fire and asked us not to make any immediate demands.

Although the cost of living increased and our expenses proportionately, we said nothing until the rehabilitated plants were again in operation and making money for their owners.
