**HOUSESMITHS' UNION AND EMPLOYERS' HARMONY**  
Local No. 78 Gets Report That Wage Scale Will Not Be Changed  
CARMEN RECEIVE AID  
Varnishers and Polishers Make Donations to the People on Strike

House-smiths' union No. 78 at its meeting on Wednesday evening received a report to the effect that all contractors had agreed to stand by the rules as to hours and wages governing the union at this time. This insures harmony between employer and employees for a long time to come, it was stated, and as a result of this, all feel in a good mood. During the evening the union was visited by committees from the striking unions and from each purchased tickets for the joint benefit ball game to be played next Sunday at Recreation park between the carpenters and the millmen. It was stated that all the members of the union were working and that there was constant demand for men. During the evening 36 candidates were initiated. On the night of the fifth Wednesday last month there was a high link by this union, which was fixed by John M. Hogan, a member of the executive board. There was a good program of songs, music and recitations together with refreshments. This union has an event of this nature whenever there is a high meeting night in a month. The next will be July 31.

"In Chicago," said the secretary of the stationary firemen's union yesterday, "the men of our craft do better than they do out here. Firemen receive \$20 a month and others get \$30 a month, while here they receive \$25.50 a day. Coal passers are paid \$38.33 a month, while here they are paid but \$2.25 a day. The increase that our craft received recently in that city was \$15 a month more to firemen and \$18.33 to coal passers.

Varnishers' and polishers' union No. 134 at its meeting at 677 McAllister street Tuesday night responded to an appeal to aid the carmen and telephone operators by voting \$100 to the former and \$50 to the latter.

Three loads of steel columns were delivered yesterday at the site of the building trades temple at the corner of Fourteenth and Guerrero streets. There are still three more loads due and when these are delivered a strong force of structural workers will be put on to erect the steel frame.

The journeymen plumbers, gas and steam fitters will enjoy a family outing at Fernbrook park on July 13.

The broom makers' union at its last meeting endorsed the carmen's strike and decided to fine any of its members \$25 if found riding on noulion cars.

Amalgamated carpenters' union No. 2 will meet tonight in sheetmetal workers' hall and elect officers for the term.

Walters union No. 30 will meet in its new quarters in 530 Eddy street near Larkin on June 27 and elect officers for the term. The polls will be open from 6 a. m. until 10 p. m. **WATERWAYS COMMISSION TO MEET IRRIGATIONISTS**  
Lately Appointed Body Will Be Represented at the Congress  
BURTON ITS CHIEF  
Congressman Writes That Members Will Be Present at Sacramento

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE CALL  
SACRAMENTO, June 6.—The inland waterways commission lately appointed by President Roosevelt will be represented in the fifteenth national irrigation congress, which will be held at Sacramento September 2 to 7. Congressman Theodore E. Burton of Ohio, chairman of the commission, writes to this effect to W. A. Beard, chairman of the executive committee of the congress.

The appointment of the inland waterways commission by President Roosevelt some time ago was regarded by the irrigation congress managers as a great step in the direction of the realization of the purposes for which the congress was held, and they have been very desirous of securing the attendance of the members of the commission.

In addition to the chairman the members of the commission are United States Senator Francis G. Newlands of Nevada, United States Senator Warner, Congressman John H. Bankhead of Alabama; General Alexander McKenzie, chief engineer of the United States army; Dr. W. C. McGee, formerly president of the national geographical association; F. N. Newell, director of the United States reclamation service; Gifford Pinchot, United States forester; and Herbert Knox Smith, director of the United States geological survey.

Regarding the commission President Roosevelt said: "In creating this commission I am influenced by broad considerations of national policy. The control of our navigable waterways lies with the federal government and carries with it a corresponding responsibility. The energy of our people has hitherto been largely directed toward industrial development connected with field and forest, and with coal and iron, and some of these sources of material and power are largely completed while our inland waterways, as a whole, have thus far received scant attention.

While the rights of the people to these and some users of water must be respected, the time has come for merging local projects and uses of the inland waters in a comprehensive plan designed for the benefit of the entire country. Such a plan should consider and include all the uses to which streams may be put, and should bring together and co-ordinate the points of view of all users of water.

**WOMEN ANNOUNCE BOYCOTT**  
SACRAMENTO, June 6.—The limit was reached in the boycott line when it was announced here today by women residing in the district north of I street and west of Twelfth that as soon as the Northern Electric starts its service in this city a boycott would be declared on all of the cars because the rates were too high. They have requested the Sacramento Electric, Gas and Railway company to put on another step, but the company refuses.

NAVAL MEN LOSE SUIT AGAINST DANCE PROMOTER  
Yeoman Excluded From Pavilion Is Awarded Only 25 Cents and Case Will Be Appealed  
NEWPORT, R. I., June 6.—A verdict for 25 cents, the price of his ticket, was returned by a jury today by direction of Justice Sweetland in the case of Chief Yeoman Fred J. Bueznle of the naval training station, who was excluded from a dancing pavilion last summer because he wore the uniform of the navy.

Justice Sweetland ruled several weeks ago that the defendant had a right to select the patrons of his dances. President Roosevelt had contributed toward a fund for the prosecution of the case, as had many officers and enlisted men of the navy. The case will now go to the supreme court.
