**AUTOIST BREAKS RECORD FOR A 24 HOUR DRIVE**

Edge Traverses 1,581 Miles on a Cement Track and Is in Fine Condition at Finish

**LONDON, June 29.**—S. F. Edge, the automobile, who started yesterday evening to drive a 24-hour record around the new Brookland cement motor track at an average speed of 60 miles an hour for 24 hours, broke all records. He covered 1,581 miles in 14 hours and 54 minutes and 15 seconds. At the nineteenth hour he had completed 1,265 miles. At the end of 24 hours his total distance covered was 1,581 miles, 131 yards, carried out his declared intention of driving an average of 60 miles an hour for 24 hours, but added another six miles an hour to it. At times Edge reached 72 miles an hour. He was in splendid condition when he finished.

**OPPOSITION CANDIDATES CHOSEN AT SANTA ROSA**

Spirited Election Takes Place When Polls Open for Selection of New School Director

**SANTA ROSA, June 29.**—Santa Rosa spent a most exciting day today, the event being the election of two members to the board of school trustees. So great was the interest taken that the entire city was decorated with the banners of the rival candidates, and all day long innumerable buses piled to and from the polling places loaded down with voters.

A ticket placed in the field four days ago and termed the "opposition" was victorious by a majority of 120 votes. J. O. Kuykendoll and Frank L. Hoyt were successful over J. W. Cline and E. W. Beatty on the "regular" ticket. The opposition had adopted as their platform the reinstatement of Professor A. C. McNeane, one of the most prominent educators of the state, who together with three teachers under him, was arbitrarily dismissed from the local school staff last June, no reason for the dismissal being given. The supporters of McNeane will control the school board.

### Weight of the Public Money Makes Antipodean an 8 to 10 Choice in the Wagering

Bill Squires, the Australian fighter, is a pronounced favorite in the betting over Tommy Burns for their 45 round bout at Colma on Thursday of this week. There were indications some time ago that Squires would be the public choice and then an impression prevailed that Burns would be favorite. This latter condition has not come about and instead it seems likely that the Australian will develop a still stronger following.

In the betting which has been done during the past few days Squires has been a 4 to 5 favorite and it is the opinion of good judges of price that the bulk of the wagering will be done at these odds. It is possible that Burns will be greatly surprised at these quotations, for when he insisted upon Squires putting up a side bet of \$5,000 he figured that he (Burns) would be favorite and that he was getting the better of the price from the Australian. Under present conditions the man from the antipodes has the big end of the bargain.

The old adage among sporting men that "money makes the market" is borne out in this case. There seems to be a flood of Squires money to be covered and this gives the men who want to back Burns a chance to get a good price for their coin. They are the ones who demand 5 to 4 and under existing conditions they will get it. Apparently the men who put up big money are stringing theirs with Squires and the small bets of the other side do not go far to cover the coin of the Squires backers.

The only explanation of the strong following gained by Squires must be that the majority of the men who have seen his work have been impressed by his style in the gymnasium and also by his wonderful physique. Added to this is the quiet confidence which Squires has in himself—a confidence which is shared by his manager, Barney Reynolds. They have gone about their preparations for the forthcoming match in a businesslike way and have shown a thorough knowledge of everything pertaining to fighting, both in the ring and in the preparations for a match.

Squires has nothing on Burns in the matter of condition, as Burns has had no setback in training and is pronounced in the best possible fettle. Burns' backers have one consolation, and that is that the short ender has the work he has done with his sparring partners. In this he has shown himself to be a hard, clean hitter, who is given more to the use of short, jolty blows than to swinging, the latter being a style of blow he seldom uses. Joe Thomas has felt the short ender's blows in friendly practice bouts and has a wholesome respect for the hitting ability of the visitor.

Burns' power in this regard is fresh in the memory of the men who saw him in this two fights with O'Brien. Whenever the latter came out of a rally it was with puffed and discolored eyes and with severe cuts, which his seconds found difficulty in patching during the minute interval between rounds. Burns showed a tendency to lose his head when he had his man in difficulty and on many occasions did not follow up his advantage.

The fight followers here invariably judge Burns by the showing he made against Dave Barry in this city in August, 1905. Barry was knocked out in the twenty-first round and it was the general impression that had Burns shown more aggressiveness he would have won much earlier in the fight. Burns has improved his style in every particular since that time and would not be recognized as the same man.

Squires has done much of his work during the past week on a padded floor resembling that on which he must fight. He is doing this to accustom himself to the footing, as the floor is slower than the ordinary one of a gymnasium. Burns has not taken this precaution, his work in the Reliance club gymnasium being done under the usual conditions prevailing in a club building.

Jeffries, who will referee the fight, will leave Los Angeles tonight on the Owl and is due in Oakland tomorrow morning. He will be the guest of his friend, Dick Adams, during his stay here. It is expected he will see Burns during the week at his country place at Pittsfield, Mass., June 29.—Pretoria authorized the statement today that Rockefeller is not in Pittsfield, and has not been here recently.

Nevada's Mine Owners and Lumber Men Elated Over Good News

**RENO, Nev., June 29.**—Mine owners, lumbermen and shippers of goods over the Tonopah and Goldfield railroad who have been affected by the embargo for the last four months received good news when the embargo came here that the embargo had been lifted. Following is the telegram that was sent to Division Freight and Passenger Agent Clapp:

"Effective today, the embargo is removed and the regular freight of every description, destined to all points on or reached by the Tonopah and Goldfield railroad, excepting freight destined to Goldfield, and to the latter point will accept only livestock, portable freight, mineral water, groceries, flour, canned goods, dried fruit and other similar foodstuffs; also grain and feed for animals."

### THIRTY-EIGHT GRADUATED FROM THE ARMY COLLEGE

General Bell and General Hall Deliver Addresses at Exercises

**FORT LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June 29.**—The graduating exercises of the United States army college were held today in Pope hall. General Franklin Bell and General Hall, commandant at the fort, delivered addresses. The graduates, including the infantry and cavalry class, numbered 38. There were five honor graduates. Second Lieutenant George C. Marshall, Thirtieth infantry, appointed from the Virginia military school, led the class with an average of 967.751 points out of a possible 1,000. The other four honor graduates were Captain M. C. Kerth, Twenty-third infantry, 965.145; Captain D. C. Rhodes, Sixth cavalry, 964.319; Second Lieutenant E. E. Beebe, Thirtieth infantry, 962.063; and Lieutenant H. L. Hodges, First cavalry, 958.540.

The five distinguished graduates were: First Lieutenant M. E. Locks, Artillery corps; First Lieutenant D. H. Currie, Artillery corps; Captain C. E. Stodter, Ninth cavalry; First Lieutenant S. Morey, Twelfth cavalry, and First Lieutenant Upton Biznie Jr., Artillery corps.

The five honor and five distinguished graduates, with nine more of the highest in standing, will become members of the new staff college class.

### OKLAHOMA CONDITIONS CHANGE PLANS OF TAFT

Has Not Decided Yet Whether or Not He Will Address Convention There

**WASHINGTON, June 29.**—The development in Oklahoma, following the vacation by the supreme court of Judge Hancock's injunction restraining the officials of the constitutional convention from calling an election with the consequent change in the program of the republican managers in the state, have made Secretary Taft's plans for the summer uncertain. He will decide in a day or two whether he can speak in Oklahoma at the earlier date set for the republican convention. His present plan is to remain in Washington for a few days, settling his business affairs and then going to his summer home at Murray Bay, Canada, for a rest.

### LOSERS JOB FOR CRUELTY

SANTA FE, N. M., June 29.—Acting Governor J. W. Reynolds yesterday summarily removed Arthur Treloard, of Lea county, from the supervisory responsibility of the territorial penitentiary upon report of Attorney General George Prichard, as referee, that charges of inhuman treatment of convicts had been proved. Governor Reynolds appointed Marion Littler, formerly of Arkansas, for five consecutive terms sheriff of Colfax county, to succeed Treloard.
