NEIL COMING TO ACT AS TELEGRAPH PEACEMAKER

Commissioner Leaves Chicago After a Conference With Committee

According to a dispatch received last night from Chicago, Labor Commissioner Neil will come to this city and try to adjust the difficulties between the telegraph companies and their employees.

The determination to leave Chicago was arrived at during a meeting between the commissioner and the members of the executive board of telegraphers in the Auditorium annex.

Meanwhile efforts looking toward a settlement of the struggle went on yesterday in Oakland with contrary reports as to results from strike officials.

"There is no conference arranged between our former employees and the company," he said. He asserted that President Small's statement to the contrary was unfounded.

"We are now operating 15 out of 17 of our offices in San Francisco and one of the offices which is still idle we do not intend to reopen.

Burnham Moffatt, an attorney, to take evidence based on the attorney general's allegations that the Postal Telegraph and Western Union telegraph companies have formed an illegal combination to increase rates in New York and other states.

BONAPARTE'S PLAN TO SMASH THE TRUSTS

Proposes to Put Violators of Law in Hands of Receivers

STRUGGLE EXPECTED

Proceeding Will Begin by Securing Injunction Against Them

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE CALL. WASHINGTON, July 8.—The department of justice officials have decided upon a new and startling policy toward the corporations violating the anti-trust act and it is expected it will be given a trial in a very short time.

The issue of injunctions, followed by the appointment of receivers, is briefly the step the courts will be asked to take in dealing with the big combinations that have ignored the Sherman anti-trust law so far as they felt easy in the belief that fines would be all the punishment they might expect.

It is the belief of the two lawyers named that the injunction receiver plan will do more to break up trusts than anything that could be tried or any new law that could be put upon the books.

MYSTERY OF MANZANITA WOMAN SUICIDE SOLVED

C. Ellinger, United Railroads Clerk, Identifies Body as That of Wife

SAN RAFAEL, July 8.—The mystery shrouding the identity of the woman whose body was found Saturday afternoon near Manzanita on the North Shore line, where she had apparently committed suicide by taking carbolic acid, was solved today when she was identified as the wife of C. Ellinger, living at 25 Byington avenue, San Francisco.

Last Friday Mrs. Ellinger, who appeared to be very much improved in health, disappeared from her home, and supposing that she had returned to the Santa Rosa ranch, the husband made inquiries for her there, but without result.

Reading in yesterday's papers that the body of an unidentified woman had been found near Manzanita, Ellinger came to San Rafael today to have his worst fears realized.

STANDARD OIL COUNSEL WITHHOLDS EVIDENCE

Company Awaits Sentence on Conviction in Federal Court

END OF THE INQUIRY

Judge Landis Announces Date for Entering His Final Order

CHICAGO, July 8.—The attorneys for the Standard oil company refused today to submit any further evidence in the investigation begun on Saturday by Judge Landis in the United States district court. Judge Landis then announced that sentence would be passed on August 3 upon the Standard oil company of Indiana, which was convicted of having profited by illegal railroad rates.

Judge Landis asked the attorneys for the company: "Have you anything to offer prior to the entering of a final order?"

In answer to the court as to whether the defendant desires to offer any evidence tending to show that the defendant, or the Standard oil company of New Jersey, never violated the interstate commerce law before, and denying the jurisdiction of the court in the premises and contending that this entire inquiry is beyond the legal power of the court, the defendant still insisting that the record shows that it is innocent of the offenses charged in the indictment, the defendant desires to offer no evidence.

The statement continued at some length that the court had no right to go outside the record of this case in inflicting the penalty, and concluded: "If the defendant enters in an appropriate proceeding where this defendant, San Francisco, without any waiver of its legal rights, subject itself to the decision of its having heretofore violated the interstate commerce law, it will certainly appear that since the passage of that law there has been no violation of its provisions by either the Standard oil company of New Jersey or the Standard oil company of Indiana."
