

He retired from the service several years ago. He leaves a widow and two daughters—Mrs. Fred L. Britton and Mrs. James Hubert—residing in Oakland. The funeral will be held at Napa tomorrow.

CORONER SAYS BABIES DRANK MILK

"Farm" in Alameda Said to Be in an Unsanitary Condition

THIRD INFANT DIES

City Chemist Will Have His Analysis Completed Thursday

ALAMEDA, July 9.—The third infant to die within three days at the baby farm conducted by Miss Ella McPheeters at 800 Pacific avenue expired last night. The body of the child, a girl of 6 months old, was removed to the morgue, where an autopsy was held and the brains and stomach of the baby removed for examination and analysis by the city chemist, A. A. Cunningham.

Dr. P. W. Stidham, who was summoned to attend the infants after the first one had died, would not sign the death certificates in any case, giving as his reason that he was unable to determine the cause of the deaths of the children.

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RICHLY DRESSED WOMAN

Leaves Note Showing That She Had Become Despondent

IDENTITY UNKNOWN

Taken to a Hospital Where Effort Is Made to Save Her Life

"I think it must be written in the book of fate that we may not have those we love too deeply; that we may not possess idols. We would be too happy in an existence designed chiefly for trial, and 'obituary' case is not solitary. I have missed life's crowning joy—the love of the one I love."

The foregoing note, together with a few telegrams evidently sent as consolation in some great sorrow, and a broken sentence in which the victim tried to tell at the central emergency hospital of the recent death of her husband, are the only clues that the police have had in the case of a woman who was found in a comatose condition in a lot at Fulton and Gough streets late last night.

THREE SAILORS DROWNED

BY CAPSIZING OF BOAT

NEW YORK, July 9.—Three members of the crew of the steam yacht Yacona, belonging to Henry Clay Pierce, the oil magnate of St. Louis, were drowned in the Hudson river early today, when a small yawl carrying six of the yacht's crew and a dockman were capsized by a sailor who rocked the boat. Four of the party were picked up by a passing tug.
