SEATTLE, July 15.—Jeffery Borel is an exceedingly unpopular young man in local turf circles tonight. He gave Ethel Day, favorite in the closing race at the Meadows, a ride that looked very raw and one that would have put a novice to the blush. Coupled as he was with the impressive victory of Fred Bent, which horse Borel had handled so expertly when he ran as public choice in the Tacoma handicaps Saturday, horsemen expected to see official action taken. None was forthcoming, however, although the intimation was given that Borel's case would be taken up by the stewards tomorrow.

DEATH OF MOTHER IMPELS YOUTH TO COMMIT SUICIDE

Fred Matta's Second Attempt to End His Life Because of Deep Sorrow Is Successful

OAKLAND, July 15.—Brooding over the death of his mother, Fred Matta, a youth of this city, made his second attempt to commit suicide tonight, and this time he was successful. Matta leaped against a post at Fourteenth and Franklin streets at 10:30 o'clock, drank the contents of a bottle of carbolic acid and fell writhing to the sidewalk. He died a few minutes later in the hospital.

BANKRUPT SALOON MAN

Frank J. Daumet of the firm of Daumet & Donnelly, saloon man, 670 Stockton street, filed a petition in insolvency yesterday. He owes \$3,251 and has a half interest in the stock, amounting to \$2,500. Among the creditors are the Market Street bank, \$1,465; the Bank of America, \$1,000; and the insurance policy of the German of Marquette, and the City and County bank, \$2,000, unsecured.

WILLIAM KREKELER DEAD

OAKLAND, July 15.—William Krekeler, a pioneer settler, died this morning at his home, 933 Poplar street, at the age of 73. He was a native of Germany. He came to California 40 years ago and was engaged in wine grape growing for many years. A widow and four children survive.

Peru to Be One of Last Steamers to Use Old Pacific Mail Wharf

The Pacific Mail liner Peru, Captain Mackinnon, sailed yesterday for Panama and way ports with a full cargo and 61 passengers. Of the passengers 20 were in the cabin and 25 in the steerage. Sixteen were Chinese. On the late arrival of freight, it was nearly 3 o'clock before the Peru took its departure. Instead of noon, the regular sailing hour for Panama liners.

DEATH OF RAMON VALENCIA

BOLINAS, July 15.—Ramon Valencia died suddenly today, aged 37 years. Valencia was once a very rich man, owning thousands of acres of land along the north shore of San Francisco Bay. He was frequently a witness for the state in land fraud cases growing out of the transfer of lands during the Mexican-Spanish regime and the subsequent investment by the United States. He left a small estate, a mere remnant of his former vast holdings.
