

ISTHMIAN ROAD WILL BE MOVED AWAY FROM CANAL

Government Plans Almost Entire Reconstruction of Railway TO SAVE HIGH SPANS

Task Necessary to Avoid More Difficult Feats of Engineering

Special by Leased Wire to The Call WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Charts received at the isthmian canal office here, showing the details of the plans for the relocation of the Panama railroad, indicate that it is proposed practically to construct a new railroad, for no work is involved that amounts to reconstruction of the whole system.

This task, which was regarded as one of the wonders of engineering when the railroad was built half a century ago, is now but an incident to the construction of the canal itself, and will be carried out in the course of a few months.

The necessity for the relocation was found in the fact that under the accepted plans for the route of the canal the present railroad bridges high enough to carry the trains over the topmasts of the biggest ships that will use the ocean link.

At present the railroad in many places is removed to a considerable distance from the line of the canal, but under the plans for the relocation the road will run almost along the banks, being carried along a ledge in the famous Culebra cut.

TWO MEN KILLED IN AUTO ENDURANCE RACE

al Accidents Attend Contest on the Denver Track

DENVER, Sept. 2.—E. V. Dasey and W. B. Felker were killed in the 60 mile endurance automobile race at Overland park this afternoon.

Dasey was with Phil Kirk in the Aperson "Jack Rabbit," and on rounding the turn was thrown out of the car. He fell on his head and his skull was crushed. He died a few minutes later.

Felker was killed on the twentieth lap. A tire on his car broke and the machine tore into the fence, throwing Felker against a post. He died before a physician arrived. Felker has been a prominent automobile dealer and racer in this city for several years.

There were seven entries in the 60 mile endurance race, but only three finished. George Maxwell won. Paul Tobin was second and Charles Brinker third. Owing to the confusion following the accident no time was taken.

WOMAN HORRIBLY BURNED WHEN OIL CAN EXPLODES

Body and Agony Lasts for Ten Hours

STOCKTON, Sept. 2.—Mrs. Sophia Cello, 21 years old, the wife of a wealthy Italian rancher living a few miles east of Stockton, died last night after 10 hours of torture inflicted by horrible burns she received while attempting to start a fire in her kitchen stove with kerosene.

Mrs. Cello, who became a bride six months ago, was preparing to cook the noon meal. The stove was filled with kindling wood and paper and in the effort to obtain quick results she began to pour oil from a can, forgetful of the live coals glowing in the grate.

Suddenly the fire flashed up the stream of oil and into the can, which exploded, spreading flaming oil over the woman. With her clothes flaming Mrs. Cello ran out of the house, screaming frantically. The husband, who was down in the well near the house, ran to her aid. Obtaining a blanket, he wrapped it about her and endeavored to smother the flames. He did so, but not until her clothes had been burned from her body down to her shoes and part of the blanket had been consumed.

A physician was hastily summoned and he did everything in his power to alleviate the intense pain. Mrs. Cello was conscious until within 15 minutes of her death and related every detail of the sad tragedy. The oil can was blown to pieces in the explosion.

MILLIONAIRE GAMBLER'S WIFE TAKES HIS HOME

Holds Residence She Wasn't Allowed to Enter After Killing Man

CHICAGO, Sept. 2.—Sick and nearly penniless, Mrs. Dora McDonald, widow of Millionaire "Mike" McDonald, the former gambling king, has returned to the family residence at 4501 Drexel boulevard, which her husband had not allowed her to enter since she shot and killed Webster Guerin, the youth who she said to have discarded her.

This action on the part of the widow has startled the other heirs, who fear it may conceal some legal trick affecting their interests. Every peaceful means possible has been taken to induce her to leave, but without avail, and an armistice has been declared between the contending factions until Wednesday, when McDonald's will is to be probated.

SHOTS GIRL HE LOVED IN BACK; KILLS SELF

Jealous Fury Leads Son of Rancher to Attempt Life of Teacher

RIDING WITH RIVAL Fires One Shot at Her, Then Turns Weapon on Self to Die Instantly

SAN BERNARDINO, Sept. 2.—Driven insane by jealousy and made desperate by repeated repulses from the girl he loved, Clifford Mattinger, a young rancher living near Ontario, last night shot and fatally wounded Miss Julia Keys, the 17 year old daughter of George Keys, a well known rancher, and then sent a bullet into his body, dying instantly.

Miss Keys was riding in a buggy with Ewing Shoemaker when Mattinger approached them from behind. Drawing a .32 caliber pistol, he shot Miss Keys in the back, the bullet striking her spine and paralyzing her from the waist down. The love crazed youth immediately leveled the pistol at his own breast and fired again. The bullet pierced his heart and he fell dead. Miss Keys remained conscious and was driven to the home of a physician. Today she is reported dying.

Mattinger for some time had attempted to keep company with Miss Keys, but she had repelled him. Last night, shortly after a o'clock, he saw her riding with young Shoemaker, and, becoming infuriated, he secured his pistol and shot her.

CHINA OPENS SEVEN MORE CITIES TO FOREIGN TRADE

Land Holding and Building Will Be Permitted in New Provinces

Special by Leased Wire to The Call WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The American minister in Peking has received a note from the foreign offices stating that since the Russian and Japanese troops have been withdrawn the following places are declared open to international trade: Feng Huang Cheng and Liao Yang in the province of Feng Tien; Ning Kua, Hun Chun and Sam Hsing in the province of Kirin, and Halla, Ers and Aihun in the province of Hei Lung Ching.

With regard to the renting of land by foreigners at these newly opened cities, special renting and building regulations will be drafted by China, and until such regulations are decided operations will not be permitted.

The seven cities are the last of 16 which were to be opened in Manchuria to international trade, as provided in the China-Japan treaty of 1905.

JEW KILLED BY BLACK HUNDREDS DURING RIOT

Revolutionists at Odessa Run Through Streets, Firing at Hebrews

ODESSA, Sept. 2.—The Black Hundreds began rioting here this afternoon, alleging that the Jews were responsible for the explosion of the bomb in the courtyard of the central police station here Saturday morning, resulting in the deaths of an artillery officer and four policemen, although it was stated at the time that the bomb was dropped accidentally by the officer. The rioters ran through the streets inhabited by Jews, shooting promiscuously right and left. Several were killed and injured.

TROMSOE, Sept. 2.—M. Francois, the French aeronaut who assisted Walter Wellman in the construction of his arctic balloon, has arrived at Berge harbor. He said he was invited to take part in the expedition, but refused as he doubted the safety of Wellman's plans.
