Oakland Asks \$50,000 of Piedmont Town

Mott Tells Trustees They Must Pay or Stop Use of Sewers. PROBLEM FOR TOWN. City's Ultimatum Follows Defeat of Plan to Annex Suburb. Greenwood Exonerates Justice of Peace Renner

SAUSALITO, Sept. 11.—L. H. Greenwood, the expert accountant who is auditing the books of the various Marin county officials, said today that in connection with the investigation being carried on, an injustice had inadvertently been done to Justice of Peace J. F. Renner of Sausalito. "The justice to whom I referred is not Renner, but another party," he stated, "and as a matter of fact I found Renner's accounts in exceptionally good shape with one exception, which was immediately rectified when his attention was called to the matter and which was occasioned through a difference of opinion between District Attorney Boyd and myself regarding a certain transaction."

Tom Johnson's Defeat Recorded by Taft

SEATTLE, Sept. 11.—The Post-Intelligencer tomorrow will say "Secretary Taft, after the election of an Ohio state member of Representative Theodore E. Burton in announcing himself as a candidate for the office of mayor of Cleveland in opposition to Mayor Tom L. Johnson, that he was greatly saddened by the news of Johnson's defeat. He received from President Roosevelt, Secretary Taft and Secretary Garfield, said: Mayor Johnson has a well-earned political machine in the largest city in Ohio, and his success in being elected to the office of mayor successive terms, together with the fact that this success has given him special prestige in the eyes of the people, has led to a policy which opposes some of the leading principles of the republican party, makes his defeat for re-election in the eyes of the people of Cleveland and the state of Ohio, but also the republican party generally. He has so entrenched himself in the position of Cleveland that only a man having first class qualifications can have any hope of defeating him. Representative Burton, by reason of his high qualities as a man and as a representative of the people who are in the best known and integrity on account of public business of great importance, is the man best qualified in every way to fill the position of mayor of Cleveland."

Fresno Trustees Ask Health Chief to Quit

FRESNO, Sept. 11.—Long continued friction between the board of health and the city trustees has resulted in a petition, backed unanimously by the latter body, for the removal of Dr. W. T. Burke, president of the board of health. The petition, which was presented today to Mayor Lyon, followed a resolution adopted by the board of health after the removal of Dr. T. M. Hayden from the office of health officer.

Famous Chef Dead

VACAVILLE, Sept. 11.—Frank Pierpont, a noted chef and former cook to royalty, and since the San Francisco disaster a chef at the Hotel Raleigh in this city, is dead, and his body has been taken to Oakland for cremation. Pierpont was one of the best known cooks in the city previous to the earthquake and boasted a record which few chefs on this coast could equal.

Oakland's Praises Sung at Club's Celebration

Hundreds of Women Gather to Hear Eloquence of Citizens. MAYOR MOTT SPEAKS. Informal Reception Follows Optimistic Addresses on City's Future. OAKLAND, Sept. 11.—The Oakland club opened what promises to be a year of unexcelled progress this afternoon, when several hundred club women gathered in Pythian castle to celebrate Oakland day. Mrs. H. C. Capwell presided as chairman of the occasion. Mayor Frank K. Mott in a happy speech expressed his appreciation of the intelligence and sympathy of the women of Oakland and asked for a larger interest in the affairs of the municipality.

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Professor Rugh's Essay is Awarded First Prize

BERKELEY, Sept. 11.—Charles E. Rugh of the faculty of the state university is the author of an essay on "Moral Training in the Public Schools," which won a prize of \$500 and now has the place of honor in a book of essays on the same subject issued by a Boston firm. Two years ago a citizen who withheld his name gave \$1,500 to a committee, including Rev. C. R. Brown of Oakland, President Jordan of Stanford and Professor F. B. Dresslar of the state university, and asked these men to conduct the money as prizes for essays on "Moral Training in the Public Schools." More than 300 essays were submitted, the first prize of \$500 going to Professor Rugh. Rev. T. P. Stevenson of Philadelphia won the second prize of \$200.

Will Discuss Tunnel Plans

OAKLAND, Sept. 11.—The project of tunneling the estuary between this city and Alameda is expected to take definite shape at a meeting to be held tomorrow afternoon. Members of the board of county supervisors and of the city councils of Oakland and Alameda will meet in joint conference. Mayor Mott of this city and W. W. Taylor of Alameda and engineers and attorneys from both cities also have been asked to attend.
