

STARTS FOR DRUGSTORE AND FAILS TO RETURN TO HIS WAITING WIFE

Police Are Searching for Charles E. Stanberry of Stockton

CARRIES LARGE SUM

Leaves Hotel Without Coat or Hat, and Foul Play Is Feared

The police of this city and Oakland are searching for Charles E. Stanberry of Stockton, who came to San Francisco with his wife and year old daughter Wednesday and has been missing since early yesterday morning.

Stanberry registered at the Carmel hotel in Third street Wednesday night. Early yesterday morning he went on an errand to a drug store a few doors away from the hotel.

The missing man has been ill with tuberculosis. His wife fears that he may have been assaulted and robbed or that he may have suffered a fatal heart attack.

The missing man is 28 years of age, 5 feet 5 inches high, weighs about 115 pounds, black eyes and dark complexioned.

MAY REVOKE LICENSES OF EIGHT PLAYHOUSES

Supervisors Receive Adverse Report From the Fire Committee

The supervisors' fire committee reported yesterday in favor of recommending that the licenses of the Davis, Emper, Wigwam, Novelty, National, Van Ness, Central and Lyceum theaters be revoked.

Action was taken on the report of Chief Building Inspector Horgan that the theaters named did not comply with the ordinance governing the construction of theater buildings.

The committee referred to a special committee, consisting of the fire marshals, chief building inspector, Chief Inspector Porter of the fire underwriters, Chief Engineer Shaugnessy and Supervisor Rixford, proposed amendments to the building ordinance requiring one-story theaters having a capacity of 500 persons to have a court five feet wide on one side thereof.

DEMAND RESTITUTION

Other Heirs May Make the German Legatees Repay \$3,000

Through the medium of a bogus heir, M. Gonsorowski and his wife, Amelia, residing in Germany, for 18 years have been receiving the income from \$2,000 left by Pauline D. Gerber, who died in San Francisco on June 17, 1887.
