Joe Gans is the Luther Burbank of the prize ring, as is shown by his ability to make two matches blossom where only one grew before.

Only one tie for first place was recorded during the afternoon. Bressi of Lowell and Service of Berkeley each jumped 5 feet 6 inches in height.

Now there is a doubt as to how formidable he is, and the only man who knows exactly where he stands in the matter is Gans. He failed to take advantage of several openings during the fight with Memsic, which led the most observant of the spectators to believe that he was not fully extended.
