## MRS. HEYDENFELDT SUES RYAN ON FRAUD CHARGE

could not attend to the matter. When I was finally able to do so I called at his office and he said: "No papers, you want Mr. Heydenfeldt's papers. They are in my safe. Of course you will want an attorney to help you."

"I told him that as he had attended to all my husband's business it would be best for him to attend to the settling up of the estate. He then took the papers out of the safe, but as I did not feel very strong I called my daughter from the next room. He objected, saying that we could look them over alone."

"He handed me several papers, and when I asked him about the envelope marked with my name he denied all knowledge of it. Finally he made a search for it. When it was found the papers which my husband had told me were in it were missing."

### RYAN'S HOT DENIAL

Ryan was exceedingly indignant when giving his views on the charges. "The whole thing," he said, "is absolutely malicious and false. I never had the envelope mentioned, never had the note mentioned. I never saw any of the papers. This suit has been commenced for the purpose of injuring me, but since it is false it can not harm me. I never saw a share of the Zella mining company in my life."

"This man Heydenfeldt was an old boyhood friend of mine. Near the end of his life, when he was ill, he was without funds and I asked Dr. Sullivan to go over and see him. A few days before he died his stepson came to me with a request for the loan of \$5, which I gave him for his father and which his mother paid back after he died. I acted as his attorney in a few trifling cases, but that was all. The whole story is false—from top to bottom. This can be seen from the facts that the alleged occurrence took place shortly after his death in 1902, and is suddenly brought into the courts five years later."

District Attorney Langdon said yesterday that Mrs. Heydenfeldt called on him several months ago about this matter. He investigated her charge against Ryan and the others, but found that there was nothing in them that would warrant any action on the part of the district attorney's office.

While it was not part of Langdon's official function to inquire into the civil aspect of the case, he said that he did not think the charges were borne out by the facts.

## FRENCH ENSIGN ADMITS GUILT AS A TRAITOR

PARIS, Oct. 26.—Ensign Charles B. Ulmo of the French navy, who was arrested at Toulon, October 24, on a charge of being a spy and who confessed to having abstracted a secret naval signal book and the naval cipher code, and Berton, an army reserve officer, who was arrested yesterday at Yverdon, in negotiating with a foreign power for the sale of military secrets, were brought to Paris today and arraigned. Ulmo confessed everything, declaring that his object was to raise money. Berton denied the charge of treason, but the correspondence seized when he was arrested seemed to prove that he arranged to deliver certain military documents to an agent of a foreign power. The latter was not named, but is understood to be German.

### WED IN NORTH

SANTA ROSA, Oct. 26.—Word has been received here of the wedding at Nome of Fred Gage Lemmon and Miss Ida C. Chaquette, both employees of the law offices of Campbell, Metson & Campbell at Nome. The parents of the bride reside in San Francisco, while the groom is the son of Allen B. Lemmon and Mrs. Lemmon of this city. The wedding took place September 28. Lemmon's father is editor of the Santa Rosa Republican and president of the state board of library trustees.

emerged from a governmental chaos, torn, bleeding, stung to the quick, with the ignominy of six years of unparalleled misrule and corruption. They have had a few weeks of decent government and they mean to have two years more of it, through the retention of Mayor Taylor and District Attorney Langdon and the election of public servants who stand for identically the things represented by Taylor and Langdon.

Every attempt to inject anything like partisanship or class hysteria into the campaign has failed instantly. P. H. McCarthy, union labor candidate for mayor, has inveighed against "autocrats and scoundrels" who, in his philosophy, include all opposed to him and his ticket, the ticket made up in the county jail. His bitter invectives and insane accusations have worked to the end that they might reasonably be expected. They have driven away thinking men, whose support might be given on principle to a legitimate union labor ticket. He has been an inconsistent and his attacks upon the men who stand for the right in San Francisco as in his laudations of publications produced under the auspices of the union labor ticket. He has been a calculated to arouse class prejudices. Honest union men have gone out in disgust from nearly every meeting McCarthy has addressed. The tide from McCarthy and McGowan to Taylor and Langdon has steadily from the beginning of the campaign, and the realization of the interests behind the county jail ticket and its principal candidates is constantly swelling that tide.

### BELL WELCOMED HOME BY EAGLES AT NAPA

NAPA, Oct. 26.—An elaborate reception and welcome home from his eastern trip was tendered Theodore A. Bell by the Eagles here tonight. Special excursion trains were run, bringing 2,000 Eagles from San Francisco, Oakland, Vallejo, San Jose, Sacramento, Santa Rosa and Ukiah.

There was a long parade in the streets of Napa with a liberal display of red fire. The drum corps of San Francisco aerle No. 5 was the feature of the procession. The reception was held at the East Napa pavilion, and addresses of welcome were delivered by State President Frank Brew of Vallejo, President F. M. Sila of Napa aerle No. 161 and Mayor D. S. Kyser of Napa.

Grand President Bell spoke in reply, telling of the progress of the Order of Eagles in the last year and urging the members to stand for good citizenship.
