HARDY'S STOCKS WILL BE RECEIVED

Wall Street Indifferent to Proposed Holding Scheme

\$300,000,000 INVOLVED

Amount of Investments to Be Disposed of Yields \$15,000,000

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Plans for a \$300,000,000 holding company for the Union Pacific system's stock investments in other railroad properties have not been received with any special enthusiasm in Wall street.

If the convertible bond holders and preferred bond holders will share in the proposed distribution, then the equities of the common stock holders will be no means so large as they appear to be under the existing arrangement.

Any removal of the investment stocks to a holding company will naturally reduce the 10 per cent common dividend to 6 per cent so far as earnings from operation are concerned.

It is expected that this reduction would be offset by the distribution proposed by the holding company.

Whatever the arrangement, it is understood that the holders of the \$75,000,000 convertible bonds will have to be taken care of.

The total amount of the investments to be disposed of aggregated \$300,000,000, which, it is officially stated, produces an annual investment yield of \$15,000,000.

SINKS IN BOSTON HARBOR

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—The steamer City of Birmingham of the Ocean Steamship company struck a ledge in the harbor early today while bound out to Savannah and sank in 10 fathoms of water about 27 miles below her dock.

The crew escaped. Her engine room quickly was flooded and her crew rowed back to the dock.
