

Registrar's Returns Show Taylor to Have Beaten McCarthy 11, 89

All Good Government Candidates Except the Treasurer and County Clerk Are Elected

Complete semi-official returns of today's election compiled by the registrar show that Mayor Taylor's majority over his three competitors was 411, and that he received a plurality over P. H. McCarthy of 11,819. District Attorney Langdon's majority was 12,528. The entire good government ticket was elected with two exceptions. John E. McDougald, union labor, defeated E. L. Cullen for treasurer with a plurality of 5,129, and Harry I. Mulcrey, union labor, defeated William P. McCabe for county clerk with a plurality of 2,770. William P. Broderick, the Democratic and good government nominee for supervisor, whose name did not appear in the good government column on the official ballot, won over T. A. Casserly, the strongest union labor nominee for supervisor, with a plurality of 5,179. The only charter amendment defeated was number 16, providing for a smaller circulation for the newspaper carrying public advertising, which lost by 3,709 votes. The ordinance providing a reduction in the amount of liquor licenses also lost by 8,187 votes. The charter amendments providing increased salaries for firemen and policemen carried by a majority of 5,725 and 5,629 respectively. The recall amendment carried with a majority of 17,369. A heavy vote was polled on the spur track amendment and close contests developed over the amendment relating to the sale of public lands and to increased salaries for employees of the department of electricity, all of which carried.

The total given for votes polled is not definite. About one-third of all precincts failed to make a return in this respect, and the total was estimated in these precincts from the number of votes cast for mayor. It is estimated that the official count will bring the total above 58,000.

PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES WITH ELECTION RESULTS

Sends Letter of Hearty Congratulation to F. J. Heney

REVIEW OF THE EAST

Victory in Many Sections of Country Regarded as Remarkable

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—President Roosevelt today issued the following statement regarding the elections held Tuesday last: "The president regards the result of the elections as extremely gratifying. He has sent a letter of hearty congratulation to Mr. Heney at San Francisco. The victory in New Jersey was precisely what happened nine years ago in the middle of President McKinley's administration. He had carried New Jersey by 88,000 and two years afterward the republican for governor had 5,900, the vote being cut down, just as has happened in the Judge Fort case. As compared with the elections next preceding the last presidential election, we have done decidedly better than we did in 1903. Then, as on Tuesday, Rhode Island and Maryland went against us, but this year we have won a sweeping victory in Kentucky for the first time since McKinley's day. The republican victory in Massachusetts was also remarkable. "The showing in Pennsylvania is equally good. The showing in New York state as a whole was excellent, far better than in any of the last presidential electoral election. That the result in Manhattan was due to purely local cause is shown by comparing it with the decisive triumphs in Brooklyn, Buffalo, Albany and Rochester generally. The president's home county of Nassau made a better showing than it ever has in an off year. As a whole, the showing has been an improvement over what it was four and eight years ago."

ROOSEVELT TO CONFER WITH RAILROAD KINGS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Statements continue to come from various parts of the country that President Roosevelt will soon hold a conference with the heads of the great railroad systems. The whole subject of the regulation of the railroads has been made at the White House for any and all of the president's confidential advisers. The president will talk with presidents of railroads as well as representatives of other interests from time to time before the assembling of congress. It is said that the president expects to see Morgan within the next two weeks and have a full discussion of matters in which both are interested. He has the highest opinion of the wisdom of Morgan's policy in regard to New York during the financial stringency.

until today was a white resident of Honolulu aware that the action had been taken. How the news leaked out is known only to the territorial officials, who have lost no time in acquainting Washington with the facts. There is great indignation among Americans here, not so much because the Japanese have pledged their loyalty to the emperor, but because of the secret methods pursued at a time when the browbeaten of the islands were perturbed over the ordering of the battleship fleet to the Pacific and actually believed that war was near. Had they been open in their expressions of patriotism, less would have been thought about it. It is known that the Japanese in Hawaii maintain a compact organization, which is ready in any emergency to place itself in the hands of the home government. Since the relations between the two nations have appeared strained as a result of the American attitude on the immigration question, followed by the ordering of the battleship fleet to the Pacific, there has been great activity in a secret way among the Japanese. Frequent meetings have been held and what occurs at these gatherings has been carefully guarded. In the event of any clash between the United States and Japan the Japanese in Hawaii will be as a unit in giving loyal support to the emperor. And every subject of the oriental monarch living here is firmly of the belief that such a conflict is near.

Hayashi Says That Japan and America Are in Accord

He prefaced his statement by expressing the hope that a sincere pronouncement by the foreign minister of Japan and its publication through the offices of the Japanese government would prevent further misrepresentation and finally result in discrediting those who are constantly circulating false and harmful reports. McCarthy's Defeat Means Finish of Union Labor Party

Langdon Says Good Citizenship Is Shown by Sterling Leaders
McCarthy's defeat saw the finish of the union labor party, said District Attorney William H. Langdon yesterday. It never again will enter a campaign, he believes, and the long struggle to keep industrial organizations out of politics has been won by union leaders like Casey, MacArthur, Sweeney, McLean and Furuseth. "The election Tuesday," Langdon continued, "also showed that good citizenship is not found solely among business and professional men of this community or any other. In fact, the determined effort of a considerable portion of the business community to accomplish the defeat of the district attorney in order to prevent the punishment of wealthy and influential criminals stamps them as the most dangerous sort of citizenship in the United States. Were it not for the loyal support given the candidates of good government by honest workingmen of San Francisco the criminal elements would have triumphed at the polls. "My tremendous majority I take as an approval of the course of the district attorney and as a command from the people to continue the prosecutions of those already indicted and brought to the bar of justice. "These prosecutions will go on now with even greater energy and determination."
