FOUR INJURED BY EXPLOSION OF OIL

Two Employes of Big Plant at Redondo May Die as a Result

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 27.—Four men were injured, two probably fatally, in an explosion which occurred early this evening at Redondo in the oil plant of the Pacific light and power company.

An explosion of gas from some cause undetermined, set fire to two oil tanks immediately adjoining the boiler room.

The injured are: William E. Thompson, aged 33, assistant engineer of the plant; probably fatally burned.
