

James Scott Proves a Clever Boxer

Is One of the Stars in Olympic Club's Successful Championship Tournament

Boxers in endless variety appeared in the amateur championship tournament held last night in Dreamland pavilion under the auspices of the Olympic club and made a huge success of the affair.

The majority of the boxers were making their first appearance in the ring and in such circumstances it was remarkable that so much class was shown.

James Scott, a representative of the Olympic club, stood out as the cleverest boxer who was seen in action during the evening.

Sam Coulter was the only one of the Los Angeles boxers to win a bout. He met Mike Roach and matters looked bad for the visitor in the first round, when he was knocked down with a straight right.

The only fault to be found with the night's sport was the overwhelming quantity provided, this was due to the fact that the officials wanted to give all the boxers who had trained a chance to compete, and they accepted more entries than could make up a good program.

The proceedings were enlivened in the second bout, which drew a lot of applause. George Cooper knocked Ed Levin down several times in the first round.

George Ryan outclassed Eddie Lawlor, but for a time it seemed the latter would outgame his opponent. Ryan finally won on points.

Ed Dickman, a boxer of the Sharky type, was easily outpointed by Jim Melvin in three rounds.

Referee Harris stopped the bout between George Noonan and George Fisher in the first round as Fisher was outclassed.

Dan Sweeney and McCarthy proved a willing pair, but they did not know anything about fighting. McCarthy won on points.

Jack Ford and James Fawcett provided some of the comedy of the evening. They looked like Kolb and Dill, but were funnier. Ford's seconds tossed up towels in the second round.

The tournament will be concluded tonight when the finals will be decided. Summary: Will Roach (unattached) defeated J. Danaher (unattached), three rounds.

Tars Fight Gamely For Supremacy

George Young and "Battling" Robinson Box 20 Rounds to Draw at Mare Island

VALLEJO, Jan. 29.—More than 2,000 naval persons, including enlisted men and line officers, gathered on Mare island this afternoon to see George Young of the transport Buffalo and "Battling" Robinson of the cruiser California fight 20 rounds for a purse of \$1,000 and the championship of the Pacific squadron.

The battle was declared a draw by Referee Charles Grennan, and the decision was received with cheers. The battle was to have been held in the drill hall attached to the receiving ship Independence, but so great was the jam of naval men from San Francisco and all of the ships in the harbor, in addition to more than 400 sports from Vallejo, that a ring with a board floor was hastily put up adjoining the hall, and the throng stood in a pouring rain for more than an hour and a half to witness the hardest fight ever seen in this section.

Young was formerly attached to the Asiatic station, and won from every man he fought there. He was 12 pounds lighter than Robinson, who weighed 165 pounds, but was game, and although during the last 10 rounds, he looked as though he was in danger of being knocked out, he managed to stay the limit. When the battle was over he was so exhausted that he had to be carried from the corner in a fainting condition.

Young opened the battle by knocking down Robinson five times in the first round. It was believed the battle would end in the second round, but Robinson, exhibiting such gameness that Young could not put him out. The first 10 rounds were all Young's, but after that Robinson came back and battered Young all over the ring, and the men will be matched again.
