BEGIN CAMPAIGN FOR UNION LABEL

Workers Again Urged to Demand Marks of Organized Crafts on Goods... Committee From Labor Council Starts Actively to Work Furthering Project

The labor committee of the San Francisco labor council will organize an active campaign soon in favor of union labels of every description.

The Frisco lines have established service between Houston, Tex., and Opelousas, La., on the new line to New Orleans from Houston, and it is expected that trains will be running to New Orleans by March 1.

The first order for locomotives for the Southern Manchuria railway has been placed in this country and calls for 183 locomotives of different types, including 69 tank engines.

A. L. Craig, general passenger agent of the Great Northern, cannot speak too enthusiastically of what San Francisco has done since the disaster.

The hop dealers are somewhat dissatisfied with the present carload rate of \$1.50 a 100 pounds, and are seeking a compromise by eliminating this rate as well as the \$2 less carload rate, preferring to establish a flat rate of \$1.75 for any quantity.

The engineering department of the Western Pacific announces that the line is 12 miles from Oroville and is now at Bloomer Sliding, and that five miles more of grade is ready for track laying.

Paul Shoup, assistant general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, has returned from southern California.

The stationery firm at their meeting Monday night pledged themselves to assist the general health committee in the sanitation of the city. They will do all in its power to carry out the wishes of the committee.

San Francisco branch No. 5 of the amalgamated carpenters and joiners at its meeting Monday night elected M. L. Bavard, J. Prosser and S. Leighton to a committee to attend the meetings of the league for the relief of the unemployed.

Molders' union has elected John L. Nolan and William P. McCabe delegates to the San Francisco labor council. Financial Secretary Nolan will leave this week on a 10 days' vacation in the southern part of the state.

The foundation for the hall to be built for the four local unions in the beer business will be laid in March, and the building, a two story structure, will be completed in 60 days.

The press feeders' union at its meeting last night presented Past President James J. Norton, who had served two years as president, a handsome gold watch and a set of engrossed resolutions. This in appreciation of faithful service. Three candidates were initiated and six applications were presented and referred to the committee on investigation.

Machinists' lodge No. 68 has appointed A. Erwin, T. Venneman, A. Treary, E. Thomas, S. Piquerez and A. J. Lunde a committee to arrange for a smoker to be given in the new hall, 223 Oak street, the first Wednesday in March.

L. E. Stanton, connecting freight agent of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, said yesterday that 21 carloads of hops had left Santa Rosa, Tuesday for London. The shipment contains 2,100 bales, and will leave still in the neighborhood of 8,000 bales in the district of which Santa Rosa is the center.

Mrs. F. Gatliff of School street, Colma, died yesterday at the Plymouth hospital in South City from poisoning resulting from eating toadstools picked a week ago in Golden Gate park by William A. Lawson of 1651 C street. Lawson thought the fungi were mushrooms and took them to the Gatliff home in Colma and Mrs. Gatliff cooked them, after taking every precaution and testing them in several ways. Lawson became ill the same night and died a day or two later, while both Mr. and Mrs. Gatliff were removed to the hospital, suffering severely. Gatliff still is in a critical condition and may die.
