ORDERS SLAUGHTER HOUSES DESTROYED

Board of Health Condemns Six Filthy Places in Butchertown District Buildings Must Be Razed and the Wreckage Then Set on Fire

Slaughter houses and shacks in Butchertown condemned and ordered torn down by the board of health: Clayburgh's slaughter house, Wagner's slaughter house, Nonnenman's slaughter house, Roth, Blum & Co's slaughter house, Helli & Barr's slaughter house, South San Francisco packing company's stables, Chinese duck ranch, Standard manufacturing and supply company's animal incinerator, Three residences, and two sheds where meat is handled.

According to the ruling of the board, eight days will be given the owners of the condemned structures in which to comply with the order. Before new structures can be built in the places of the demolished ones, the buildings must be put in a thoroughly sanitary condition, rubbish or refuse burned or carried away, and the provisions of the ratproof ordinance complied with to the letter...

OBJECTOR SQUELCHED J. Nonnenman, owner of Nonnenman's slaughter house, which was declared one of the most unsanitary of those condemned, objected vigorously to the order to tear down his buildings.

Nonnenman, however, was told that he must comply with the order at once. Latip, it developed that he was also owner of one of the condemned shacks and part owner of the stables of the South San Francisco packing company, another structure that was found by the health officials to be in a loathsome condition. Again Nonnenman became heated in his own defense.
