"I consider it the greatest insult that was ever offered to me here yesterday. It was humiliating in the extreme to have to turn out my pockets before the whole class, and later to be searched separately by Professor Crofts, but I couldn't object because of the false position in which it would have placed me. If it hadn't been for that I certainly would never have consented."

After school adjourned at noon yesterday the class remained for a special meeting on the call of President Horace Fairchild. Professor Crofts was in the room.

"Shall I go out?" he said.

PASS RESOLUTION

"No," said Fairchild briskly, "stay right where you are." Crofts stayed. Then Louis Godeman, one of the pupils, introduced a resolution, which was passed by a vote of 10 to 2.

Further details of the manner in which the search was conducted were told by several of the pupils. First, the children were told to take everything out of their pockets and lay it on the teacher's desk. After that each boy was taken outside by Professor Crofts and his pockets turned inside out, while Miss Cox took the nearly 20 girls to a cloakroom and felt in their garments. One girl remarked that somebody might have the money in her shoes. Straightway all the girls had to take off their shoes to prove that they did not.

Milo Thompson, one of the older boys, offered to search Monroe Rothchild and a fight nearly resulted. Rothchild and E. Nontaka, a fellow pupil, were out of the room when the search began, but they were not immune. In Rothchild's pockets was a five dollar gold piece, his own money, and the Japanese boy had \$25. If he had not been out of the room when the money disappeared, the pupils say, the situation might well have been embarrassing.

Miss Frances Buckland and her chum were also out of the room and returned just in time to be searched and they heard no objections. I am certain we were within our rights."

"Would you take the same action again?" Morton was asked.

"No," he answered, quickly.

VALLEJO FLOAT TO BE BIG MODEL OF CRUISER

Citizens of Navy Yard Town to Join Celebration of Fleet's Arrival

VALLEJO, March 6.—People here are taking much interest in the coming battleship fleet, and steps have been taken to join the festivities planned by the metropolitans.

The committee on parade has decided to construct an exact counterpart of the armored cruiser California, the model to be between 50 and 60 feet long and drawn by 20 white horses. It will be manned by a trained crew of the sons of Vallejo's citizens.

Captain Flinchbaugh, commander of the navy yard, has granted permission to place subscription lists in the shops, that all may have an opportunity to assist in the undertaking.

The general committee in San Francisco has left the question of floats to the Native Sons of California, who, it is understood, had decided to have but three floats, and these of a floral nature, which is to be hoped that Vallejo's float, which is so typical of the occasion, will be accepted.

BUSINESS CONDITIONS SHOW IMPROVEMENT

Dun's Report Tells of Increasing Confidence and Industrial Activity

NEW YORK, March 6.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade will say:

Favorable symptoms are more numerous in the general outlook, especially in respect to the growth of confidence. Jobs are more sure to replenish depleted stocks, orders in many cases being for delivery next fall. The advertising season has also contributed by accelerating the distribution of spring goods and stimulating interest in the building trades. Industrial plants are more active, pig iron productions rising to the last weekly average in three months. Credit is still closely watched, and mercantile collections are by no means satisfactory, yet payments are more prompt and the volume of business is distinctly better.

Bradstreet's tomorrow will say in part:

The iron and steel industry unquestionably has better outlook, especially in respect to the week ending March 5 number 287, against 254 last week, 172 in the like week of 1907, 177 in 1906, 190 in 1905 and 200 in 1904. Canadian tallies for the week number 40, against 35 last week and 23 in the like week of 1907.


THREE BANKRUPT

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PRISONER ESCAPES THROUGH A SEWER

Sheriff Puts Check Passer in Monterey Jail and He Vanishes

MONTEREY, March 6.—Walter C. Smith, alias Harold Radcliffe, who passed a number of worthless checks in this city and Pacific Grove, escaped from the jail here this afternoon. The prisoner had been brought here for examination on two charges.

Pending his departure for Salinas Sheriff Nesbitt placed Smith in the city jail. Workmen had been engaged in putting in a sewer and had cut a hole in the wall large enough for a man to crawl through. The sheriff did not know of this hole in the wall and gave his prisoner the freedom of the corridor.

When Nesbitt went to the jail for his prisoner the man had vanished. Smith escaped from the county jail at Salinas two months ago and was at large about two months.

The sheriff and his deputies are searching the surrounding country to-night for Smith.

BOY THIEVES CONVICTED

NAPA, March 6.—Fred Klingner and James O'Kane, two San Francisco boys, 14 and 13 years old, were tried today before Justice Coombs on the charge of having stolen bicycles in Calistoga, and were sentenced to serve six months each in the county jail. The sentence later was modified, and the boys will be turned over to Probation Officer Arthur J. Todd of San Francisco.

REVENUE OF WONDERFUL NEW MINING CAMP WILL GO TO ESMERALDA COUNTY

Churchill Board of Commissioners Decides to Withdraw Dispute From Courts

RENO, March 6.—The threatened battle between Churchill and Esmeralda counties to determine which was entitled to the taxes from the new and flourishing mining camp of Rawhide has been averted by the report of T. K. Stewart, an engineer employed by Churchill county to make an official survey of the boundary line between the two counties.

Stewart has shown definitely that Rawhide lies several miles to the south of the line within Esmeralda county, and there is no chance for a dispute. The survey was made from the old Mason house, built in 1861, which established the beginning of the official survey in 1881.

Stewart's report to the Churchill county commissioners settles the dispute definitely and the commissioners have decided to withdraw all action started in the courts.

Esmeralda county will continue to receive the revenue obtained by taxes from the wonderful new camp of Rawhide.
