
At the home of Mrs. W. J. Burke at Corbin station near the old dumping grounds women from the neighborhood carried this afternoon to talk over the situation.

Wright is 26 years old, 5 feet 6 inches tall, weighs 150 pounds and has brown hair and blue eyes. He wore a black suit of clothes and a black, soft hat when he left Oakland.

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HAS GARBAGE OVENS FOR THE BAY CITIES

Salesman From Leeds, Eng., Stops in Oakland to Offer Incinerators

OAKLAND, March 9.—Herbert Alexander of Leeds, England, is in the city, a guest at the St. Mark hotel, for the purpose of selling garbage incinerators to the cities of Oakland and San Francisco.

Another scheme is to utilize the sewage. Sewers lead to tanks instead of to the sea. The solids are allowed to settle and then they are pressed into cakes and used for fertilizing or else are distilled.

SAYS NEW CULT RUINS HIS HOME

Husband Alleges Wife Strolls Through Grove in Embrace of Man Disciple

Files Cross Complaint in Suit for Divorce and Seeks Custody of Child

OAKLAND, March 9.—The teachings of a cult advocating advanced forms of new thought and recruiting its membership largely from divorced persons were responsible for the breaking up of his home, according to a cross complaint which Alan G. Clarke of Berkeley has filed against the suit for divorce instituted by his wife Margaret.

Mrs. Clarke went to a camp or summer home which the cult maintained in Santa Cruz, declares the husband, and this was against his wishes. He followed her, he said, and she admitted, alleged Clarke, that she had allowed a disciple of the cult to stroll with her through the groves with his arm about her waist.

Afterward, says the husband, he discovered that his wife was entertaining a woman devotee who pretended to be a "deity," and Clarke says there was a scene when he ordered the pretender out of his house.

Clarke also alleged that his wife was a poor house keeper and had refused to cook his meals. Finally she deserted him, taking with her their minor child, he alleged. Clarke asked for the custody of the child and a decree of divorce.

Suit for divorce for alleged cruelty has been filed by Gladys Adelaide Coffey against Alfred J. Coffey, and by Converse Smith Grow against Sarah A. Grow for desertion.

GOLDFIELD CLIMATE TOO MUCH FOR ARMY CAPTAIN Officer in Charge of Companies Returns Ill From Mining Camp

The two companies of the Twenty-second infantry that have been at Goldfield since December 7 are again at their posts at Angel Island and Monterey. Captain W. H. Wassell, who has been in command of the troops at Goldfield, returned seriously ill from exposure.

Captain James E. Bell, Second infantry, soon will leave for Fort Brady to take charge of the quartermaster's department at that point. Captain Bell has been stationed at department headquarters since he came back from the Philippines on sick leave.
